WXYZ Videotapes Program Of Poet Frost's Appearance

In an unprecedented gesture of community responsibility, WXYZ-TV (Channel Seven) today made an outright gift to the Detroit Educational Television Foundation of a valuable videotape of Poet Robert Frost's recent recital at the University of Detroit.

The one and one-half hour tape of Frost's "Evening of Poetry and Informal Talk" was presented to the Foundation by John P. Fival, President of WXYZ-TV.

"OUR DECISION TO videotape Mr. Frost's talk for educational television was made in accordance with our continuing policy of maximum involvement in the cultural and educational life of our community," Fival said.

Frost's talk at the U. of D. Memorial Building Nov. 14 was videotaped by a 15-man remote crew. All videotaping expenses for the Frost recital, attended by more than 500 persons, were borne by WXYZ-TV.

In his talk, the 88-year old Frost dwelt largely on his creative experiences as "America's unofficial 'Poet Laureate.'"

Accepting the Frost tape in behalf of the Detroit Educational Television Foundation was C. Allen Harlan, Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The Foundation, a non profit organization, has 16 producer-members.

SIX TV STUDIOS are maintained within the Foundation, three by Wayne State University, two by the University of Detroit and one by the Detroit Board of Education.

Foundation productions are telecast over WTVS (Channel 55).

In addition to presenting the Foundation with the Frost tape, WXYZ-TV gave the University of Detroit a transcript tape of the entire "Evening" as a permanent historical record of the occasion.

The U. of D. Friends of the Library will make film transfers.
