It's an ill wind that blows sparks from an autumn trash fire. Burning trash and leaves outdoors leads to many burning buildings. The principal hazard is flying sparks caught by vagrant breezes and lodged on rooftops or out of the way crannies of wooden structures.

These precautions should be taken when burning leaves and dried vegetation on the premises: Pick a day and time when there is no wind; keep a lawn hose handy; wet sides of building next to fire; keep burning some time before a blaze starts.
