Rev. Gets Call By Lutherans

Pastor Stegmier is a graduate of Michigan State University and a 1961 graduate of Hamma Divinity School of Springfield, Ohio. The congregation called him formally into being when it organized on October 28, 1962.
 Pastor Stegmier will be installed as Pastor by Dr. Frank P. Madsen, President of the Michigan Synod of the LCA on February 17.

Spiritual Advancement Is In Great Need Today

What is our most urgent need in the twentieth century? "Spiritual advancement," Thomas A. McClain of Chicago will explain in a Christian Science lecture here Monday, January 21, at 8 p.m.
 "What hope is there for this spiritual advancement? There is more than just hope, since everyone has an 'unbreakable link with God,'" Mr. McClain will tell an audience in Eighth Church of Christ, Scientist, 2001 Grand River. He'll describe this link with God as "spiritual sense," the active awareness of man's divine origin and nature.
 "SPIRITUAL SENSE is like a pilot light in human consciousness, which can never be extinguished," according to the lecturer. "This pilot light of truth burns, dimly or brightly, in each of us."
 "When we become willing to turn on the gas," he claims, "then truth floods human existence with the warmth and power of God's goodness and love."
 Mr. McClain, who is a member of The Christian Science Board of Lecturers, will speak here at the invitation of Eighth Church. He will be introduced by Pierson J. Ide, First Reader.
 "To help of man's sonship with God" was "first revealed in Christ Jesus," according to Mr. McClain. "Christ awakens us from our material relationship to God, his divine source."
 This "Christly message of spiritual redemption" still speaks to us, the lecturer says, "as it speaks to this age as an age of scientific thinkers."
 He notes that "we see evidences all about us of scientific and spiritual advances." Yet, "mankind seems beset by fears." We are discovering, he observes, that materialistic knowledge cannot save us from the fears and other "dire effects" which come with such knowledge.

Living Christ Movie Series

Another full-color motion picture in the Living Christ series will be shown Sunday, January 20, at 7 p.m. in the Squid Community Church, 21222 Indian Street (between Beech and Jackson, north of Eighth Mile Road) according to Pastor Raymond Bayne who will elaborate on the cultural background of the times in connection with the film.
 The film "Bohndoll and Baptism" starts "with the return from Egypt and dramatizes the home and school training of the boy Jesus."
 IT INCLUDES the boy of the temple as well as the advent of Pontius Pilate as governor and his political problems with "Caesar and Herod." It introduces John the Baptist, explains his message to the Herodian throne, highlights the growing influence of John's message, and vividly depicts the baptism of Jesus.
