AMENDMENT TO SEWER CONNECTION CHARGE ORDINANCE THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCE A. That Paragraph 1. of Sewer Connection Charge Ordinance adopted May 26, 1959, and effective June 5, 1959, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

1. That to parcel of property within the Township of Farmington shall hereafter be connected with any public sewer or drain until the owner thereof shall have first obtained a permit for such connection and shall have paid to the Township Treasurer a connection charge as follows:

(a) For each dwelling unit located or to be located upon each parcel of property the sum of \$350.00. A "dwelling unit" is defined as any building, portion of a building or other enclosure, including house trailers or mobile homes, designed for occupancy by one family for residential purposes and having cooking facilities. With respect to trailer parks, every trailer space equipped or to be equipped with sewage disposal facilities shall be considered to be a dwelling unit whether or not such space is actually occupied by a trailer at the date of the application.

(b) For other than dwelling units, a sum to be fixed by resolution of the Township Board. In determining such sum, the Board shall give due consideration to the relative benefits to be obtained by the particular type of occupancy involved by the abatement of sewage disposal facilities as compared to the benefit obtained by a single dwelling unit. The sum shall not be limited to the relative amounts of sanitary sewage to be discharged into the sewer system.

B. That amendatory ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.
