Diabetes Week Test Results Are Disclosed

Of the 2,840 persons who received blood sugar screening tests for diabetes in the Diabetes Week Detection Program conducted at Northwood Center and Pontiac General Hospital in November, 151 were suspicious for diabetes, according to Dr. Kaine, chairman of the Michigan Diabetes Association. "These persons and their physicians were sent letters notifying them of the test results. The test used is not definite proof of diabetes, and the diagnosis cannot be made until a second test is taken through further tests as decided by the personal physician," Dr. Kaine asserted.

LOCAL SPONSORS OF the program were the Oakland County Medical Society and Department of Health, the Pontiac General Hospital, and the Oakland County Medical Society's Diabetes Association, a Michigan United Fund Agency. Participating statewide agencies included the Diabetes Association, the Michigan State Medical Society and the Michigan Department of Health.

"It is most important that those with diabetes seek medical guidance as soon as possible," Dr. Edwin DeLong, Chairman of the Oakland County Medical Society's Diabetes Detection Week Activity advised. "Any delay in diagnosing diabetes and getting it under control can be dangerous. With prompt diagnosis and treatment, complications may be avoided and the new diabetic can almost always continue his job and live a perfectly normal, active life. In many cases hospitalization is not required."

Twenty-one Boy Scouts from Troops No. 169 and No. 116, both of them from the Farmington area, are just about in the middle of a test for the Nature Merit Badge.

Mr. Hartley Thornton, of 2115 Violet in Floral Park, is their instructor and will administer the test. The test will be given almost three months to go before everything will be completed. All 21 boys in the group are from the Floral Park brothers, Keith and Rich Carlson, of 23037 Violet are among the 21 who are participating. They will meet the third Wednesday of each month for the instruction. They are given most of their instruction right on the spot so they can observe what they are learning in trips to the Prok Lake area.

THE NATURE COURSE includes bird study, insects, reptiles and bird nesting.

Mr. Thornton says that when the boys are through the training course they are really conversant with each subject as the on the spot instruction is accompanied with manual study.

If the course is completed in time they will witness the Migrating Birds at Pointe Pelee and their banding.

The course helps the boys immensely with their biology studies at school. They learn to recognize trees and plants by their different categories and the birds by their known habits.

Each instruction session is ended with a question and answer period so each boy is usually familiar with the day's lesson. The final test is made up of about eighteen or twenty questions, chosen at random from any part of the three manuals that have been selected.

Mr. Thornton says that by the time the boys have passed the test they have really earned the right to wear the Nature Merit Badge.

Teams of Michigan State University geophysicists are "mapping" Michigan underground to provide new clues to the location of oil and mineral deposits.
