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The Pontiac Northern Huskies were knocked from their cloud by the Farmington Falcons last Friday night by a score of 66-65. The winning margin was provided by Dale Pitcock as he calmly sank two free throws with only 25 seconds remaining.

Northern, which had previously roared through six straight Inter-Lakes Conference games was heavily favored to extend its streak to seven. However, judging from Farmington's play, Coach Jack Quigley's cagers had apparently not been notified of this.

The Falcons are still one game behind the frontrunning Huskies with only three league games left to play. Farmington is looking for help from Waterford, Southfield, or Berkley in hopes that one of these teams might knock out Pontiac. Northern which had a six point lead, 8-2, in the first quarter, but Farmington finally thwarted the Huskies' hopes by leading 14-12 with Walt Grimalta's six points leading the way. Husky forward Roger Hayward hit a jump shot at the score at 14-14. Hayward also collected six points in the first eight minutes.

Farmington opened up a six point lead, 22-16, as Grimalta dumped in three straight baskets early in the second quarter. However, Northern barked and finally knotted the score again on a basket by guard Mike Burklow. The scoreboard read 29-29 at half-time after Grimalta and Paul Chatzka had combined for 14 of the Falcons' 15 second quarter points.

The Huskies ran off to a seven point lead, 43-41, in the third quarter, but forward Chuck Gaddie finally found the range as he swished seven points to keep the Falcons within striking distance in Farmington. The gap to 48-40 on a free throw by Dale Pitcock at the buzzer. Pontiac guard Jerry Reese had the hot end of the score as he scored 11 points.

The final quarter, probably the most exciting one of the season, had the crowd on its feet as the score was tied up seven times. The Huskies again grabbed the lead, 58-56, with only three minutes left.

Chatzka then hit two long set shots with two minutes and 30 seconds remaining to push the

Falcons into a 60-58 lead, but Gary Hayward tied it again, 60-60, with a short jumper. Pontiac grabbed back the lead, 65-64, with only 50 seconds remaining on a three point play by Dale Pitcock. After Dale crushed both free throw calls, Farmington and gave Farmington the 66-65 winning margin.

Five foot eight Chatzka led all scorers with 21 points on nine field goals and five free throws. Six foot five Grimalta followed with 20 points, and six foot seven Mike Burklow followed with 17 points. Pitcock and Dick Fusco rounded out the Farmington scoring with seven and two points respectively. Northern's top scorers were Hayward, who tallied 17 points.

Although many of the so-called "experts" had predicted an overwhelming favorite to win the game, it wasn't really such an upset to see the Falcons conquer the Huskies. Farmington has a better team than what many of the games this season — even in the ones they've won — show. Now all that can be hoped for is that both the team and the fans continue displaying the same fine spirit that was shown last Friday.

Any snow night will be a good night to keep up this enthusiasm when the Falcons take on the Southfield Jays here at F.H.S. in the Inter-Lakes Conference game on Wednesday, Feb. 13, at 7:30 p.m.

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Beginning with the 1964-'65 sports season, there will be only four schools in the Inter-Lakes Conference, caused by the dropout of Berkley and Southfield.

These two schools will join four members of the present Eastern Michigan League — Birmingham Seaholm, Royal Oak Kimball, Ferndale and Hazel Park — in forming a new league. The remaining four teams of the EML — Mt. Clemens, East Detroit, Roseville, and Port Huron — will be left in the same situation as Farmington, Walled Lake, Waterford, and Pontiac. They will be left with a league of only four members.

Because there will be only four members in each of these two leagues, a major problem will be created in trying to set members of the other larger leagues in this area will still be playing their league games.

Therefore, a temporary two-year moratorium has been set up between the four schools of the Inter-Lakes and the four schools remaining in the EML. The Inter-Lakes will play football and basketball. According to Athletic Director John K. Cotton, the four schools left in the Inter-Lakes will play two of the EML schools in football and all four of them in basketball.

In other words, in the seasons of '64-'65 and '65-'66 Farmington will play three league football games, two non-league games with schools of the four-team EML, and four other non-league games. In basketball
