


### Army Center Proposed Here

It has been learned that the possibilities of locating an Army Reserve Center in Farmington Township are now being explored. Two possible sites are being considered. One is an approximately five-acre parcel of land in the triangle bounded by Tuckey Nine Mile and Shawnee roads and the other site is about the same size on Middlebelt Road north of the Middlebelt School.

An artist's conception of the center proposed has been submitted to the Township Zoning Board for consideration along with a request for a public hearing on the proposed center. The proposal is scheduled for discussion at the next regular meeting of the Zoning Board on Thursday, Feb. 28.

### Twp. Fire Dept. Releases 1962 Fire Figures

The Summary Report for the Farmington Township Fire Department for the 1962 year was released by Township Fire Chief George Hume this week. The annual report shows that a total of 453 alarms were received during 1962 compared with just 406 in 1961 and 353 in 1960. The largest single increase came in the number of grass fires reported last year, 157 compared with 123 the previous year.

TOTAL CASH LOSS due to fires in Farmington Township during 1962 has been estimated at \$106,265.

According to Chief Hume, the major cause of all grass fires was carelessness in burning rubbish.

He reported that dwelling fires which there were 101 last year resulted from defective heating equipment in most cases. With the exception of irregular services, winter wiring and over-fusing not uncommon causes.
