**First Graders Taken on Tour Of Post Office**

The first grade children in Room 5 of Flanders School took a field trip to the Farmington Post Office recently. The class was accompanied by their teacher, Mrs. Marion Spencer.

The purpose of this trip was to give the children an opportunity to view modern day mail processes in operation.

Preparation for this trip was begun about three weeks prior to the visit. Many audio-visual materials were used to aid the children in this preparation, including library books, filmstrips, still pictures and cancelled addressed envelopes.

After a considerable amount of time was given to the experience of addressing an envelope correctly so as to assure delivery to the designated addressee, each child addressed an envelope with his family name and street address. The address of the Flanders School was used for the return address. Into each envelope went the child's home-made valentine intended for his or her family.

A COMPOSITE letter was also written and addressed to their own classroom at school. This particular letter, and several of the others, was mailed in the dropbox at the corner of Flanders and Farmington Roads on the way to the postoffice.

Mr. Louis Gay, superintendent of mails, acted as guide for the tour of the post office. The children dropped their letters in the dropbox, saw them cancelled, sorted, and placed in the proper pigeon hole for each address. Mr. Gay answered the children's questions and gave each one a souvenir machine stamp.

As a follow-up to the field trip the children anxiously watched for their letter to be delivered. Postmarks were observed as to place, date and time of mailing. One letter was returned to the school because of incorrect addressing. This one returned letter made Mr. Gay's admonition very clear - legible handwriting is very necessary on all mailed material if it is to be delivered to the intended address.

This was the fifth field trip taken by the class this school year.
