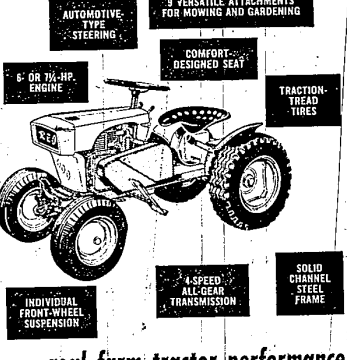

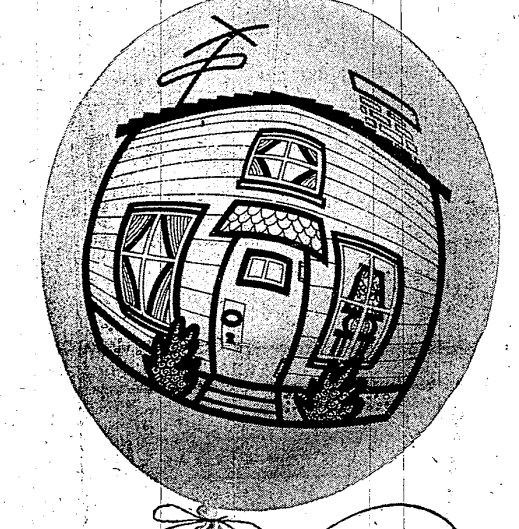
David Nauman became nine on the 10th of March and had a few friends over for cake and ice cream. His godparents were also there to wish him well.

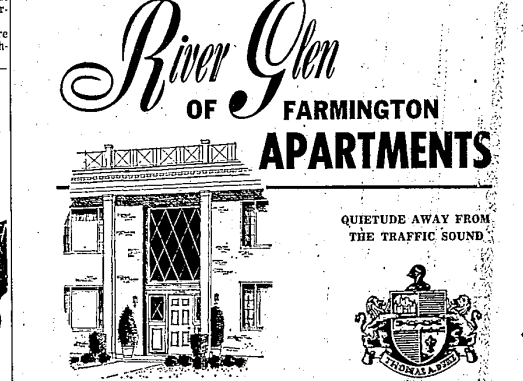
