

Grimala & Gadde Lead Falcons To Dist. Cage Tourney Title

When the New York Yankees get in trouble, they make a call out to the "M-squad" of Mantle and Maris.

Last Friday against Inkster Farmington fell behind, but were quickly surged on by victory by the G-Men - Wail Grimala and Chuck Gadde.

Playing like twins, Grimala and Gadde each stuffed in 16 runs and watched off 20 rebounds in leading the Falcons to the District Championship by defeating the Vikings, 66-54.

This was the second straight year that the Falcons have knocked off Inkster for the championship. Last year Farmington outlasted the Vikings 65-63 to take the title. Last week's game, however, proved to be a little more decisive for the Falcons as they led almost the whole game.

The fired-up Farmington quintet jumped off to a quick 8-2 lead in two field goals by Grimala and one chuck by Gadde and Dale Pitcock. Grimala snuffed many of the Inkster attempts, but the Vikings, paced by Carl Simmons, came right back and gunned into a 12-8 lead. Grimala added a free throw to make the first quarter score 12-9.

The Falcons rallied at the start of the second period and knotted the score 22-20 on a free throw by Tom Kauffman. Then Farmington shot out into a 20-14 lead, mainly on the hot shooting of junior forward Dave Schlack.

Inkster narrowed the gap to 20-21 but the Falcons gradually picked up steam and raised the lead to 29-22 at halftime. Guard Paul Chatzka led the comeback with six, Boy Leach with six, Greg Wilson and Glen Hoppenstedt with four apiece; and Dan Dustin had two. Cleveland was down out of action for about a month.

The top floor shooting percentage among the regulars was maintained by Wail Grimala and Russ Cleveland who shot 50 per cent of their shots. Dale Pitcock, Chuck Gadde, and Paul Chatzka also had fine shooting with 50, 45, and 44 per cent, respectively.

Top in free throw shooting percentage was Chuck Gadde with 66 per cent. He was closely followed by Russ Cleveland with 63 per cent and Paul Chatzka with 62 per cent.

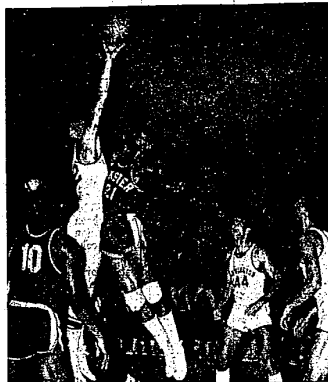
The two top rebounders were Wail Grimala and Chuck Gadde. Big Wail snatched 17 rebounds and "chuckin" Charley grabbed 16.

The junior varsity was paced in the scoring department by John Olander with 17 points. Then followed Chris Christian with 11; Mike Maatala with 8; Dave Nichols with 5; Boy Leach with 3; Terry Taggart with 2; Neil Stark with 1; Terry Nelson with 1; Dick Johnson with 1; Brian Dates with 1; Richard Smith and Bob Hejly with five points apiece.

John Olander had the best field goal percentage as he hit 10 of 20 per cent of his shots. Max DeLoach had the best free throw percentage, striking 71 per cent of his free throws.

The two top rebounders were John Olander with 17 points and Max DeLoach with 12. Olander's credit and Marshall Ballman with 7.

STRIKES AND SPARES Huron Relays Dates Set

A total of 89 high school track teams are entered in the eighth annual running of the Huron Relays, to be held at Eastern Michigan University's Bowen Field House.

In the Class A division, EMU track coach and meet director George Marshall says that Farmington Senior High School is among the 75 schools expected to participate, while 32 schools have entered the Class B competition. Among them is North Farmington High School. Last year 68 schools participated in the Relays, 50 in the A and 38 in the B.

INDIVIDUAL PRIZES will be given for first, second, and third places in all events. Championship and runner-up trophies are given to the winning schools in each class.

Preliminary competition for the Class B championship will begin on Friday, March 29, 2 p.m. with Class A schools getting underway the next day at 1 p.m.

Finals for Class B will start Friday evening at six while the A schools' finals begin at 6 p.m. on Saturday.

Schools expected to be in attendance for this meet will have come from as far away as the northern part of lower Michigan and from as far east as Cleveland, O.

Lansing Sexton took top honors with Phil Northern and Ypsilanti close behind. Farmington failed to place in the tournament.

All last year Koenig carried an average of 131 with his team, C and G Auto Electric, but now stands a chance to advance even further in the national March of Dimes Mallochg tournament.

Stan Secosky Captures State Wrestling Crown

Stan Secosky of Our Lady of Sorrows High School in Farmington captured the 138-pound state wrestling championship as the Lancers' star in the 11th annual state wrestling championships among 48 schools competing in the state Class B tournament held in Lansing.

In leading the Lancers' state wrestlers who qualified for the state finals, Secosky rolled up four impressive decisions in favor of the final match ending in the first defeat of the year for his opponent, Mike Patterson of Sparta High School, previously unbeaten in 20 dual wrestling matches.

THE JUNIOR stand out from Sorrows earned a convincing 5-2 decision over John Thomas from Farmington before advancing to the title match against Patterson. He had earlier blanked two wrestlers, 2-0 and 7-0, in advancing through the opening rounds.

Secosky had placed fourth in the state competition last year in his weight division and along with Dave LaFond, who also captured the fourth place berth, netted ten points for the Lancers in the team standing.

Captain Dan Potter was understandably proud of the title won by Secosky as it comes after only four years of wrestling at Our Lady of Sorrows.

"THIS IS THE FIRST state championship we have ever had in our sport at Our Lady of Sorrows, but the way this team has developed I'm confident it won't be the last one either out of these boys," Potter said.

Although three valuable men will be lost to the Lancer wrestling squad through graduation next year, returning to the team will be the long-time leading Kuzinski, Rick Reda and Mike LaFond who all completed in the state finals this year. Seniors Dave LaFond and Chuck Dobos also wrestled in the state finals.

DAVE LAFOND, who had the best individual performance record for Sorrows this year, won 7-2 and 7-0 decisions in Lansing before bowing to the eventual state champion in his 132-pound weight division and dropping the consolation match.

Dobos scored the quickest decision of the state finals when he pinned his opening round opponent in just 45 seconds. He also led in close 5-2 decision to the third place finisher in the heavyweight division.
