The Women of Kendallwood Farms

Recently six members of the Women of Kendallwood Farms attended an orientation for volunteer workers at the Plymouth State home and training school. We agreed to be present at this session, with not a little apprehension. We attended as a duty to our organizations, but we were the most interesting and completely unforgettable morning any of us have ever experienced.

I'M NOT SURE what the other women expected but I had visions of dark, dirty, colorless and probably moldy buildings with a very depressing atmosphere. We arrived at the school and found a beautiful building with floors of tile that glistened with polish.

There were numerous groups of lounge chairs placed for the use of visitors as well as a clean, cheerful coffee shop. We were greeted with friendly warmth and directed to the auditorium. Mr. Boyd addressed us with casual frankness. He explained the origin of the home, the need for more space, retardation in general, and the ever increasing needs of the home, including volunteer help.

After a very informative discussion with Mr. Boyd and the head volunteer workers, we were allowed to visit the other buildings. The toddlers building was our first stop. It was near lunch time so the children were restless, but happily playing in groups of two and three. There are twelve children for each staff member in the dining room. Like our own children, there are adults who eat like us, but they are not our children. They are others who take as long as 45 minutes. All of them need some help and this is where volunteers could be of tremendous aid. We were guided to their classrooms which were delightfully bright rooms with small tables and chairs. The children finger paint, draw, play with clay and have some speech therapy.

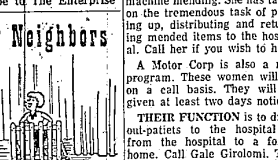
Playtime is when they listen to music, sing songs and hear stories. This is much like our nursery schools where playtime and education are combined.

On the third floor of the main building we came to the nursery. Here were perhaps 15 babies. Recently we have begun group discipline. One girl was mending. Merle Glick picked up a car full of items for hand and machine mending. She has taken on the tremendous task of mending mended items to the hospital. Call her if you wish to help!

A Motor Corp is also a new program. These women will be given at least two days notice. THEIR FUNCTION is to drive out-patients to the hospital or from the hospital to a foster home at Gale Gravelton. This won't take more than two hours a month of your time.

When so much help is needed it's pretty difficult to sit back and remember you are not needed when you give of your possessions. It is when you give of yourself that you truly give.
