

Wd. Ck. Village Election Held

The voters from the Village of Wood Creek Farms in Farmington Township were called to the polls Monday, March 11, to elect two new councilmen and re-elected Council President Norm Kreider. All three were unopposed.

The new Councilmen are Mrs. Virginia Swift of 28400 Westbrooke Ct. and Benjamin G. DeCooke of 2035 Spring Drive. Not seeking re-election for the two-year terms were Mrs. Conrad Lam and Mr. Arthur Bush.

Of the 204 registered voters in Wood Creek, a total of 45 residents went to the polls, located again this year in the home of Vernon Fisher on Wellington Drive. The slightly more than 30 per cent turnout was disappointing to the Council but equaled the voting percentage elsewhere in the Township.

The Wood Creek Council is short one member due to the death of Councilman Carl Ambrose whose term doesn't expire until next year. The Council has 30 days to appoint a replacement and indicated they would call a special meeting later this month to act on the matter.

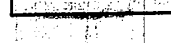

TO FINANCE the township's proportionate share of the cost to provide this year around his time activities program, township voters will be asked to approve a special 1/2 mill (\$50 per \$1,000 valuation) tax levied on April 1. The Farmington City Council has already gone on record as being willing to pay its proportionate share of the cost for the proposed program on the basis of population out of its general fund. This would figure out to somewhere between one-third and one-quarter of the total cost of the program.

(Continued from Page 1-A) early as three weeks to three months from the time of order. Bid estimates on the price for the equipment fell more in line but not all the firms submitted bids covering each item specified.

The low bidder could not specify delivery before June 10 on the butterfly valve specified in the contract. Of the five companies who submitted bids, Du Bois Copper of Detroit indicated it could make delivery in three weeks and the East Jordan Iron Works stated it could make delivery as specified but only bid on one of the items in the contract.

SUPERVISOR HALL expressed confidence that the Township would be able to meet the May deadline at Detroit for the construction of the valve wells so as to not make it necessary to tap into the 5-inch water during its eight mile road during its peak period of operation.

The valves themselves won't be needed by the Township until they fall when the expected Township Water Supply System construction will be completed and ready for testing. Use of the Township Water System will not be unnecessarily delayed upon completion next fall by constructing the valve wells in time to be on the peak period of water consumption which opens in May and often extends into November.

Church Okays Service Road

Whether or not to grant the Beechview Swim Club an easement for a roadway along the west side of the Beechview School to property to the north of the school was the subject for discussion at the Board of Education meeting Monday night.

Primarily Episcopal Church property abuts the school property on the west and the Board decided that church officials should be consulted on the matter. In connection to this proposed service roadway, a letter received by the Board indicated that they did not stipulate that they would be opposed to any use of the road on Sunday mornings when church services are in progress.

The decision to develop a philosophy for the whole district like this was prompted by dissatisfaction expressed by some Board members with a proposed philosophy which had been developed for North Farmington High by the North Central Association.
