WHERE TO BUY:

- Buy only from a reputable, well-regarded fur establishment with a good name for fair dealing.
- Patronize a fur store that offers storage and remodeling services; they'll want to make sure you are satisfied and will take pride in the condition of your furs.
- Avoid stores which survive on "bait advertising" (the perennial super-bargain sales). This doesn't include bona fide sales run by most respected establishments.
- Ask questions; reputable retailers welcome the opportunity to tell you what you're paying for and why.

PROTECTION

To the relief of both reliable retailers and consumers the Federal Fur Products Labeling Act of 1952 established this rigid code for presenting information about furs—on invoices, labels and advertising—for every fur product selling at more than \$5.

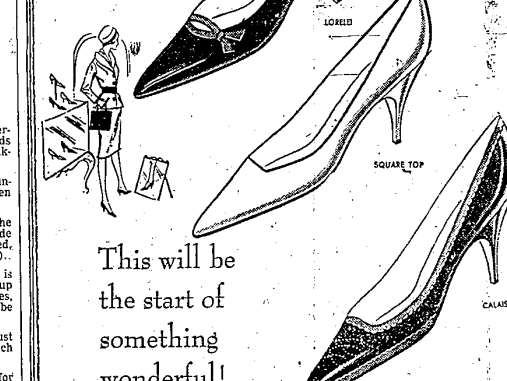
- Name: The animal's true English name must be given.
- Origin: Name of the country of origin must be given for all imported furs.
- Processing: If such is the case, disclosure must be made that a fur has been bleached, dyed or lip-dyed (blended).
- Pieced: If the garment is entirely or partially made up of pieces, tabs, bellies, sides, flaps or gills—this must be disclosed.
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
