Michigan Bell Sets New High In Wages Paid

Michigan Bell Telephone Company today reported that it paid wages of \$19,210 to its 55 employees who worked in Farmington, South Lyon and Northville during 1962.

For its 21,878 employees throughout the state, the company reported its wage bill at \$14,057,025 set an all-time record.

In addition to Michigan Bell's payroll, Western Electric Company, the manufacturing and supply arm of the Bell system, paid \$8.0 million to its 1,310 employees who work in Michigan Bell and the other two Bell System units, with total wages of \$157 million, thus contributed substantially to the economy of more than 400 home communities last year, said Hughes C. Bronaugh, manager for the company.

Michigan Bell is the state's fourth largest non-governmental employer and operates 273 exchanges throughout the state.

Michigan Bell's 1962 payroll topped the five-million-dollar mark in Detroit, Flint, Grand Rapids, Saginaw and Southfield.

Areas which passed the one-million-dollar mark were Ann Arbor, Battle Creek, Bay City, Benton Harbor, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Livonia, Marquette, Mt. Clemens, Plymouth, Pontiac, Port Huron, Roseville, Royal Oak, Traverse City, Wayne and Wyandotte.
