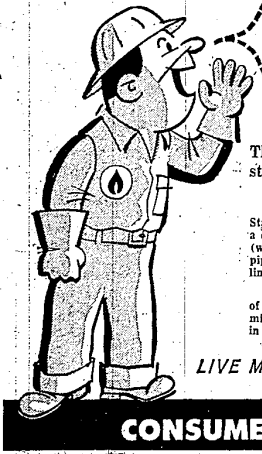
The Orchard Methodist Church Mid-Week Lenten Services are being held each Wednesday evening during Lent from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m.
