Sealed Bids for the purchase of general obligation bonds to be issued by Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, of the par value of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) will be received by the undersigned at 20210 Middlebelt Road, Livonia, Michigan, in said School District on Thursday, the 4th day of April, 1963, until 8:00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated December 1, 1962, will be coupon bonds the entire issue to be in the denomination of either \$1,000.00 or \$5,000.00 each, at the option of the purchaser, will be numbered consecutively in the order of their maturities from 1 to 1,500, inclusive, or 1 to 300, inclusive, depending upon the denominations, shall bear interest from their date of issue at 3 1/2% or rates not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/4 or 1/10 of 1%. Such interest will be payable on June 1, 1963 and December 1, 1963, and semi-annually thereafter on June 1 and December 1 of each year, both principal and interest to be payable at a bank or trust company qualified to act as Paying Agent under the statutes of the State of Michigan or the Federal Government, to be designated by the manager of the original account purchasing said bonds. Said interest rate of each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only and represented by one interest coupon only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at time of delivery.

Bonds maturing in the years 1964 to 1976, inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.
Bonds maturing in the years 1979 to 1991, inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity at the option of the School District in inverse numerical order on any interest payment date on or after June 1, 1978, at par and accrued interest thereon to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium for each bond so redeemed, as follows:
2% of such principal amount if redeemed prior to June 1, 1980
1 1/2% if redeemed thereafter but prior to June 1, 1984
1% if redeemed thereafter but prior to June 1, 1987
1/2% if redeemed thereafter, but prior to June 1, 1990

No premium will be paid on bonds called for redemption on or after June 1, 1990.
Notice of redemption to be given to the holders of the bonds to be redeemed by publication not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries as a part of its regular service notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption of said bonds and said bonds are presented for redemption or not, provided the School District has money available for such redemption with the Paying Agent.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from the 1st day of May, 1963, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest to the School District. Each bidder shall state in his bid the interest cost to the School District, computed in the manner above specified. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or a price less than 100% of their par value will be considered.

The bonds of this issue may be registrable as to principal only on books kept by the Paying Agent.
The said bonds are payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied without limitation as to rate or amount as provided by Section 28, Article X of the Constitution of the State of Michigan.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$30,000.00 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the School District shall accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good-faith checks, and the checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder or by registered mail, if the bidder so desires, to the address shown on the check. Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified approving opinion of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, which opinion shall be printed on each bond and will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds ready for execution at his expense. Bonds will be delivered without expense to the purchaser at a place to be designated by the purchaser. The usual closing documents, including a certificate that no litigation is pending affecting the issue of said bonds, will be delivered at the time of the delivery of the bonds.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.
