

TOWNSHIP CANDIDATES



Byron Walter

A relative newcomer to the Farmington community is Byron D. Walter (Republican) of 2634 Greythorne Trail who moved here from Redford Township 2 1/2 years ago. He had lived in Redford for 7 years.

Walter, 31, is married and has four children ranging in age from 13 to 2 years old. An attorney with Monaghan and Monaghan and Cramer for the past 11 years, Walter holds a bachelor of arts degree from Morningside College and a law degree from the University of Michigan.

WALTER is a member of the Michigan, Detroit and American bar associations. He is president of the Kimberley Association, active in the Bethesda School PTA and a member of the organizational committee of the Bethesda Swim Club. He has been an active Republican party worker both in Redford and locally.

IMPROVING local business conditions would require the following things, Walter feels: "The improvement in business conditions cannot be accomplished merely by a campaign to encourage Farmington residents to shop in Farmington. Private business itself must engage in merchandising practices that will cause people to want to do business here rather than elsewhere.

Good, well-appointed shopping centers, properly maintained and operated are essential to the development of good business conditions. The Township can and should make certain that shopping centers meet these requirements, are properly located in the Township and do not become a nuisance that each tends to destroy the effectiveness of the other.

Every effort should be made to avoid cluttering the community with isolated businesses that tend to create unattractive conditions and mark the community as an undesirable place in which to do business. However, in the final analysis, it is the businessman's job to sell his product, whether it be merchandise or service, to the public.

WALTER HAD this to say regarding closer cooperation between the city and township: "The City and Township are two separate political subdivisions responsible to different population groups, which require each government to exercise its powers and authority for the benefit of its people. Nevertheless, in certain areas we do have a common interest that is not true of other adjoining cities. As our school district overlaps and includes the area, the tax base in one necessarily affects the other. It is therefore essential that we cooperate and encourage the development of suitable commercial and industrial areas throughout the community so as to lighten the tax load for all."

Furthermore, in the area of zoning and planning, we should coordinate our respective plans so as not to destroy the plans of the other. We should coordinate our activities so as to develop a sound and suitable recreational program to meet the needs of all our children. As there is a common interest in so many of our community activities, we should always consider the effect that our actions might have on the other in resolving the problems that come before us."

"I think this is one area where there is room for plenty of improvement. There was no excuse for the township administration to let its feet in providing adequate financing for our joint City-Township Library. Robert H. Nelson has served as a Justice of the Peace in Farmington Township since July 4, 1959. He is 42 years old and has lived at his present residence, 2847 Hawberry, for years past. He and his wife, Sibby, have one child, a daughter, 6 1/2 years old.

Nelson holds an A.B. degree from the University of Detroit (magna cum laude); an M.A. degree from the Harvard Business School; and an LL.B. degree from the Harvard Law School. He is a member and past chairman of the Fact Finding Subcommittee of the Greater Farmington Youth Guidance Committee. He is also past secretary of the former Farmington Township League of Subdivision Associations; a member and past chairman of the Normandy Hills Association; a member of the Kendallwood Association (various committees); former member of the Farmington Civic Association (various committees).

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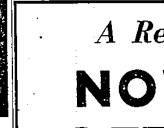

There was no biographical information submitted to the Enterprise on the only Democratic candidate seeking a Park Commissioner post, Bernard S. Kahn of 28545 Spring.

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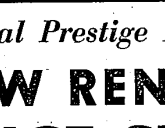
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Stoic Society Inducts Local EMU Students
