

# Report 101 Kiwanians Now Serve in Congress

A total of one hundred and one Kiwanians are serving in the Eighty-Eighth Congress of the United States, according to information received by Walter E. Gale, President of the Kiwanis Club of Farmington. The information came as the result of a survey conducted early this year, Gale said. There are twenty-three Kiwanians in the Senate, and seventy-eight in the House of Representatives, he added.

In announcing the extent of Kiwanis participation in the Eighty-Eighth Congress, Kiwanis International President Merle H. Tucker, Gallup, N. Mex., pointed out that Kiwanis, which constitutes less than one percent of the country's population, contributes more than a sixth of its national legislative leadership.

"THIS IS IN KEEPING with our traditional emphasis on the importance of assuming individual citizenship responsibility," Tucker said.

Two well-known members of the Senate, both long time Kiwanians, are in both the House and Senate. They are Senator District Governors, and their comments, too.

Said the Honorable John Sparkman (Alabama), former Governor of the Alabama Kiwanis District and former nominee for the United States Vice Presidency:

"When I first came to Congress twenty-six years ago I was pleased to find that fellow Kiwanians were in both the House and Senate, where I was serving, and the Senate of the United States. Through the years it has been interesting to note the increasing number of Kiwanians that taught through the years the principle of service and the principle of citizenship responsibility. It is not surprising then that so many in whom these principles have been instilled seek to serve the public."

The Honorable Karl Mundt (South Dakota), former Governor of the Minnesota-Dakota Kiwanis District, said:

"The 1953 theme of Kiwanis International - 'Responsibility, the Key to Freedom' - is no more aptly demonstrated than in the Congress of the United States. Within this national legislative body are many members of Kiwanis. In fact, more than sixteen percent of the Members of the House and Senate are Kiwanians. It seems to me that this Kiwanis representation in the Congress not only exemplifies a key Kiwanis objective, 'to develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and patriotic citizenship, and to bring to fruition for us in Congress the fervent desire of all Kiwanians to contribute one's talents and energies to the preservation and enhancement of freedom both here at home and abroad.'"

U. S. Congressman William S. Bromfield from Michigan's 13th District is an active Kiwanian.

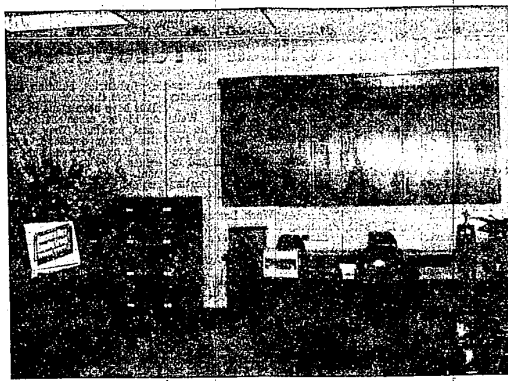
