Timely Tips on GARDENING

SPRING LAWN CARE is the perfect setting for a lovely home and garden, and although few homeowners realize it, a lawn is a planting that can not underestimate. Any of the beautiful lawns surrounding English manor houses were established over 500 years ago, and there are a few that are as old as the hills.

For a lawn to remain beautiful, it needs care, especially during the rapidly growing, closely spaced grass plants soon deplete the nutrients in the soil. If fertilizer isn't added periodically, the better types of grasses will be unable to grow and weeds and undesirable grasses will take over. Healthy, strong grass plants are better able to resist disease and insect damage and to withstand drought.

LAWNS NEED NITROGEN, phosphorus, and potash for satisfactory growth. The nitrogen is necessary for leaf and stem growth; the phosphorus for root growth; and the potash for general vigor and disease resistance.

All three must be supplied in a form which the plants can use. The formula that best meets the needs of lawns has two equal parts of nitrogen, phosphorus and one part of potash. An example of this is the so-called 10-10-5 formula. A 10-6-4 formula is also frequently used.

Most commonly used are the commercial, chemical fertilizers. In these, the nitrogen is in the form of ammonia or nitrate compounds and is available for use almost as soon as applied. They give quick results, but are not long lasting
