Plans to initiate action leading to adoption of home rule in Oakland County were launched last week by the Oakland Citizens League.

President William H. McGaughey announced formation of a committee to study application of the new Michigan constitution's provisions to Oakland County.

Patterson of 28337 Kendallwood Drive in Farmington; Henry L. Woodlenden, attorney, of 1375 Kensington Road, Bloomfield Hills; Frederick G. Nash, attorney, of 130 Endicott Road, Bloomfield Hills.

## Give Training Course Report In School Dist.

An outline and discussion on the business training courses offered students in grades 8 through 12 in the Farmington public school system was made at the regular meeting of the Board of Education Monday night.

The presentation was given by members of the commercial departments from the district's two high schools. The practice was started over two years ago of having a part of one of the Board's meetings each month devoted to presentations on various phases of the educational program being offered in the local schools and bringing Board members up to date on needs, improvements and problems being encountered by the various departments.

Under the chairmanship of Jerry Spink, a school principal, and Wilma Gummerus, chairman of the school district's commercial department, the commercial teachers in the system discussed all phases of the commercial training program presently offered students and answered a number of questions raised by Board members.

Discussion emphasis was placed on the newer courses being offered including personal typing for college bound students, notebook, a course in retailing and another course in business law.

These presentations on various phases of the school system's curriculum have now been scheduled for the first part of Board meetings in an effort to attract a greater number of citizens to attend. Thus far, however, little citizen interest has been shown in these presentations made on the third Monday night of each month during the regular school year.

## Cranbrook Academy To Open New Exhibit

McGaughey said, "The League is going to follow up on the new constitution's victory to press for enabling legislation to secure county home rule."

The new constitution makes it possible for a county to organize its government under its own charter, subject to approval of the voters and the legislature.

The League's home rule committee will begin a study and analysis of the present costs of county government," McGaughey said, "and of ways to avoid excess county expenditures and overlapping units of jurisdiction."

He said the League plans to work with other nonpartisan and civic groups in the county, such as the League of Women Voters, to promote county home rule. It will also urge the support of members of the Oakland County delegation in the state legislature to help make home rule a reality.

"We need to streamline Oakland County's government to better handle the administrative complexities in a fast-growing county," McGaughey said. "With home rule, we can establish permissive relationships between units of local government to meet metropolitan problems through joint administration of functions and sharing of costs."

Home rule has been the Number One goal of the Oakland Citizens League since its founding 25 years ago. A chairman for the League's home rule committee will be elected by its membership.
