Mrs. Rowland will speak on the subject, "The Lifting Power of Prayer."

MAY ROWLAND is the director of the Silent Unity Department of the United Church of Christ, a non-sectarian religious organization that has its world headquarters at Unity Village, New Summit, Mo. Unity school disseminates its teachings by means of the books, magazines, (Daily Word, Good Business, Progress, Unity and

Weekly Unity), and other literature it publishes and labels. Unity Centers such as Unity of West Suburbia here in the west suburban area. The Silent Unity department, which Mrs. Rowland heads, is widely the best known of the Unity activities. Silent Unity has maintained a constant 24-hour prayer vigil by consoling workers for many years, as persons in trouble wire, or telephone this group for prayers at all hours of the day or night.
