Gloria and Bill Devlin were the hosts for a farewell dinner party last Saturday evening for Wilma and Don Pratt. Other

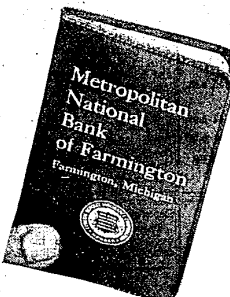
