Twin Valley Requests Sidewalks to School

Sidewalks in Twin Valley Subdivision came to for consideration Monday night, July 1, at the regular meeting of the Farmington City Council.

Two Twin Valley residents appeared at the Council meeting to urge that the City take action to provide sidewalks north from Twin Valley Court to Ten Mile Road so as to allow children the most direct route to the schools.

It was the recommendation of City Manager John Dinan that the request for sidewalks on either the west or east side of Farmington Road between Shawnee and Ten Mile be deferred until a later date, pending consideration of several physical problems involved.

THE CITY MANAGER recommended that the City adopt a resolution requesting the owners of four lots (40, 48, 53 and 58) in Twin Valley Subdivision to install walks.

Dinan's report to the Council suggested that providing the sidewalk from Twin Valley Court south to Shawnee would allow adequate pedestrian access to all the public services in the general area and would avoid, what he described as a very hazardous condition at Ten Mile Road and Farmington Road.

The steepness of the hill on Farmington Road just below Ten Mile, it was pointed out by Dinan, not only presents a physical problem for the construction of sidewalks but also would encourage pedestrian traffic at a hazardous intersection.

Vehicular traffic approaching Ten Mile from the south on Farmington Road are restricted by the hill from having a clear line of vision until only a few feet from the intersection where children would be crossing.

The contour of the property and the steepness of the hill where the proposed sidewalks would be located are only a few of the problems which would have to be considered, according to Dinan. A walk on the east side of Farmington Road, at its lower point, would require the approval of the Farmington School District which owns the land. Permission from the School District for the installation of the walk would be the first obstacle, since the land at this location drops off quite rapidly from the brim of the road and would require considerable building up before a walk could be properly installed.

THE TWO RESIDENTS who appeared to advocate sidewalks north along Farmington Road to Ten Mile were Howard Eddy, of 24196 Twin Valley Court and Jack Patten of 24166 Twin Valley Court.

Their principal argument was that children not provided with sidewalks north to Ten Mile Road would be forced to take a circular route to school, via Shawnee and the service drive to the School District Administration Building, also heavily traveled they maintained.

Okay Funds for Adult Guards

With a definite show of reluctance, the Farmington Board of Education acted Monday night approving the underwriting of the cost for another school year for three adult crossing guards at previously determined dangerous road crossings in Farmington to Township.

The reluctance was not providing the guards' since Board members felt they definitely are needed. It was rather with the feeling in mind that this expense belongs with the township and not the school district.

The three locations, the same as those where adult guards were provided during the last school year, are: Middlebelt Road at 14 Mile, Shawnee Road at Middlebelt and Farmington Road at Bayberry.

These are the only locations the area safety committee has recommended for adult guards.

At least one and possibly more locations where crossing dangers have been reported are being studied by the committee.

One other suggested location for adult guards if such are recommended by the committee.

(Continued from Page 1-A) \$1,000. The last bond issue approved in 1962 will require a levy of 1.8 mills. The total principal and interest indebtedness to be paid during the coming year on the last three issued, runs \$209,120.

THE CONFUSION which seems to develop each year over what school tax rates really are results from the fact that these taxes are levied on state equalized valuation and not assessed valuation. Instead of applying the equalization factors given them by the state each year to the assessed valuations on property, most city and township treasurers apply the equalization factors to the tax rates themselves for easier computing.

In the Township of Farmington this results in a school tax bill being shown on the tax bills of more than double what they actually are since the township's equalized valuation is more than double its assessed valuation. In the city the rate shows about 10 percent higher since the city's state equalization factor is about 1.1.

Charles David Slifer of 33615 Hillcrest Drive in Farmington passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital in Pontiac June 25 at the age of 81.

He was born December 1, 1882, at Bunker Hill, Illinois, the eldest son of William E. and Martha Anderson-Slifer. He was educated at Shortell High School, Alton, Ill. and was a graduate of Highland Park University, Des Moines, Iowa.

MR. SLIFER HAD been a traveling salesman for the Park Davis Drug Company of Detroit for 14 years. He and partner, Frank Dunn, of Peoria, Ill. were owners of the Mountain Valley Water Company of Detroit.

He was united in marriage to Miss Junia Smith on December 27, 1909. To this union was born a son, Robert, who died in infancy. The couple made their home in Detroit for 40 years before moving to Farmington after Mr. Slifer's retirement. The couple had celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary four years ago.

He had been a long-time member of the Westminster Presbyterian Church of Detroit; a life member of the Masons (Moslem Temple Shrine of Detroit) and the Rotary Club. During his lifetime he was very active in all three.
