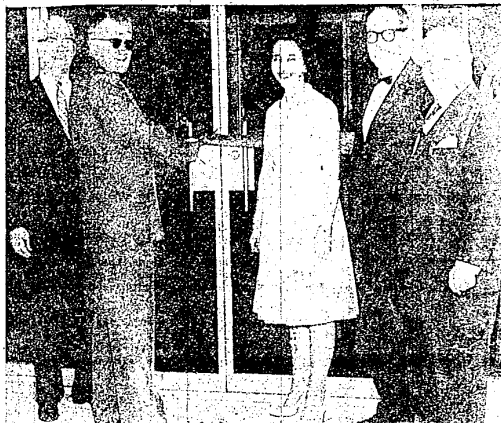

City and Twp. Building Reports

work was started in the first half of 1962. One of the apartment house developments was the River Glen which accounted for \$468,000 of the total valuation figure.

THE FIRST SIX months of this year saw construction begin in the City on three industrial plants, an apartment development and the Our Lady of Sorrows Credit Union Building.

Valuation on the three industrial plants totaled \$288,000 and includes Barry Millwork, 2303 W. Eight Mile Road (\$24,000), Form Seal Company, 34000 W. Nine Mile Road (\$72,000), and Rapistan Keystone, Inc., 33000 Nine Mile Road (\$175,000). The Credit Union Building is valued at \$45,000 and the efficiency apartment project being developed by Virgil Cornwell is valued at \$48,608. Both new buildings will front on Grand River Avenue in the City.

Residential construction dropped in the City, 39 new home permits were issued from January 1 to June 31 this year compared with 52 for the same period in 1962.

TOTAL VALUATION on the 39 home permits for this year is \$708,352 while the valuation on the 52 issued for the same period in 1962 was \$662,740.

The garage permits issued by the City since Jan. 1, 1963, total 15 with a valuation of \$14,818. Three more than this were issued for the first half of 1962 totaling \$18,714 in valuation.

Two commercial buildings, not included in special permits issued by the City, totaled \$85,000 in valuation. This is a marked

increase in the valuation figure of \$29,000 which was set for 2 permits issued for commercial buildings in the first half of 1962. Commercial additions totaled \$16,550 in valuation for the first half of 1963 in the City on a total of 6 permits issued. This is another area where the City showed an increase over 1962's first half when only 1 commercial addition was started totaling \$1,200 in valuation.

HOME ADDITIONS for the first half of 1963 in the City totaled in valuation \$22,471 on 19 permits issued. The figure for the first half of 1962 was just three higher (22) totaling \$24,990 in valuation.

Other figures for the Township for the first half of 1963 show commercial and industrial permits totaled 3 for a valuation of \$312,600, 31 garage permits were issued at a valuation total of \$63,155; 14 pool permits were issued at a total valuation of \$141,600; one church started with a valuation of \$150,000, and a new school put under construction valued at \$25,000.

In a survey of golf state residents who use Michigan's state parks in 1962, 96 percent indicated a desire to return. The survey was conducted last year by the Michigan House of Representatives committee on parks and public recreation.
