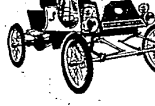

Freeways Help You Get Where Tourist Attractions Abound

(Editor's Note: "How to Make Eyebeams out of Tways" is the title of a series of travel articles sponsored by the Enterprise and Automobile Club of Michigan. They are dedicated to making the 1963 travel season enjoyable and more profitable for Michigan's tourist industry.)

The concern being expressed by many communities and resort areas that Michigan's thousands of miles of new freeways will cause the motoring public to pass them is not shared by Automobile Club of Michigan. "Motorists cannot get anywhere or any place while they are on the freeways," said Jerry E. Fisher, Auto Club touring manager.

They can use the freeways for the purpose for which they were built—fast efficient methods of traveling between two areas. Fisher says they save time, sleep, buy gasoline or even to look at the scenery."

"This automatically calls for a re-evaluation of the motorist with the more ordinary highways of the state. We have tried to do this by breaking Michigan into seven areas served by these freeways. The areas are: the Detroit area, the western end of the state, the central part of the state, the northern part of the state, the southern part of the state, the western part of the state, and the eastern part of the state."

FISHER SAID the newly-developed driving pattern in Michigan is a change from the old freeways, is causing two distinct variations from the past. One, he said, is that motorists no longer pass through the middle of every town in the state by the thousands, obstructing local traffic and frustrating everyone.

He also said, is the fact the freeways have extended the areas within which communities and resort areas must compete for the tourist trade. The new freeways, he said, are competing with others in the state, and he said, they are now competing with other areas.

"It places a greater burden than ever on communities and resorts to advertise," FISHER said. "When the public is made aware of what is being offered, and where to find it, they will get off the freeways and onto the back roads, to sound most interesting."

Auto Club has prepared a series of seven articles covering the entire state, each of which is presented in the pages of a "circle" four state folders.

"EACH OF THEM has been designed to present a sampling of what can be found in the area covered," he said. "It would take a book of considerable size to cover every attraction in the state, and this is not possible in the pages of this publication."

He said that these folders will find the things we have omitted because of lack of space, and will also feed the thrill that goes with discovering new places.

Fisher suggested motorists take along road maps when they travel on freeways. "We feel that to find side roads, the byways that will lead to new adventures."

City Council, Manager Plan Keeps Growing

The council-manager plan of local government continued its rapid growth during the first six months of 1953 as 32 additional communities in the United States and Canada adopted American communities now operate under the council-manager plan. In the United States, the majority of all cities between 25,000 and 200,000 population now use the plan.

The city manager plan was adopted by 10 additional cities with a population of 100,000 or more in 1953. Among them were: Warner Robins, Georgia (20,000); Alma, Quebec, Canada (20,500); Niles, Illinois (20,500); Anson County, North Carolina (24,862); and Barrie, Ontario, Canada (20,243).

Grand Island, Nebraska (23,742), accepted the council-manager plan after having previously abandoned it in 1955. Since 1958, over 96 percent of all communities that have adopted the council-manager plan still continue to operate under it.

Seventy cities per year, on the average, have adopted the council-manager plan since 1950. Sixteen of the 31 cities with a population over 250,000 are council-manager communities. Four of these have populations in excess of 500,000. They are: San Antonio, Texas; San Diego, California; and Cincinnati, Ohio. The largest local government using the council-manager plan is Davis County, Oklahoma, Florida, which has a population of 947,000.

The council-manager plan originated in 1908 when the council of Staunton, Virginia, appointed a municipal manager. Four years later, Sumter, South Carolina, became the first city in which the plan was adopted by the vote of its citizens.

Under the plan a city manager is appointed by the elected city council to serve as the administrative head of the city or county government's departments under the general direction of the council.

In addition to the 1,923 council-manager communities in North America, there are 1,732 cities and counties in Finland, Ireland, West Germany, Norway, and Sweden that use the council-manager plan.

Tips on How Transplanting Should Be Done

Whether you grow your own plants from seeds or bought from a local greenhouse, transplanting methods are just the same. Watch the weather forecast for one day that says "cloudy day tomorrow" and begin the transplanting process the night before.

First, with a sharp knife, cut the soil from the roots of plants in a flat, cutting through the soil until you feel the flat. When you have cut lengthwise and crosswise each plant will have its own "island" of soil around it. This "island" is easy to lift from the flat.

Next, soak the soil thoroughly. You can do this with plain water, with a solution of one of the soil-preventing hormones (which also induces root formation) or with a solution of any complete fertilizer (which gets plants off to a good start).

AFTER SOIL is soaked, set plants to drain and go to bed early. Awake to cloudy skies and rain. If you have a lot of plants, you may wish to set the plants in a tray.

Borrow a pancake turner from the kitchen and use this to lift plants from the flat. It works far better than a trowel. But do use a trowel when you dig a hole for each plant. Make the hole larger and deeper than the root system of the plant. Set each plant in its hole so the soil level around the plant is even with that in the garden.

If necessary, push back some soil into the hole to insure this. Pull in more soil around the plant, firm it with the fingers, leave a slight depression in the soil around the plant to hold water and then trickle in just enough water to settle the soil of the roots.

IF YOU COULD, if plants were grown in pots you do not need to cut between plants in a flat, but otherwise transplanting is just the same.

No shading will be needed as long as clouds remain; otherwise use sheets of newspaper laid over the plants to keep off some of the sun for a few days. Water the plants every other day for 10 days. This should keep them from wilting. After that water on the plants once a week and then only when there has been no rain for a week.

Have you found that dry beans now rank among the great variety of convenience foods? Pre-cooked dry beans that cook tender in 20 to 30 minutes to make good old-fashioned warm bean soup are now, marketed in 32 states. Little navy beans and pinto beans are pressure cooked at the factory, then dried for convenient packaging. It takes about 20 minutes to re-hydrate beans in boiling salted water. No other soaking required. These new beans products will benefit the producer as well as the consumer... perhaps more beans will be used than before.

With Summer Camping Season Comes Reminders for Safety

Trips into the outdoors are healthy diversions for most people, however, campers are exposed to certain unique risks which may cause emergency medical attention.

In addition to the usual annoyances, such as mild sunburn and simple muscular strain, camping may bring more serious, life-endangering situations, including: severe falls, drownings, allergic reactions, lightning strokes, and poisonous snake bites.

And, because outdoor living increases risk of contracting poliomyelitis and tetanus, immunization against these diseases is necessary protection for a vacationing family.

CAMP SITES should be selected with care to ensure the good health of campers. Camping where water and sewage systems are not available, or are inadequate may create sanitation problems that constitute a threat to health.

Sites should be well drained and not near marshes or swamps, in which insects and rodents breed.

An adequate, safe, readily accessible supply of drinking water is necessary and garbage and sewage facilities should be located at a distance from the water supply and from swimming and fishing sites.

Even in summer, camping in mountain areas may bring about medical problems usually associated with prolonged exposure to cold in winter.

In case a camper becomes frostbitten, emergency therapeutic measures call for warming the patient's body with garments, nearby open fires, and skin-to-skin transmission of body heat from other persons.

A hot bath is the most effective way to warm the body, but care should be taken not to immerse frostbitten areas in hot water. Such areas may be immersed safely in lukewarm water for a period of not less than three hours.

THE CAMPER WHO strains to get up a steep slope or climbing may find it necessary to apply tape, or an elastic bandage, to enable him to return to the injured limb, and the camper should see a physician as soon as possible after such an injury.

Severe injuries usually are caused when a thunderbolt strikes a person, and treatment (which should be applied only by a doctor) depends on the specific damage produced by the lightning strike.

Heat stroke is more likely to occur in older persons who suffer from heart ailments, or from alcoholism.

When a young person suffers a heat stroke, it usually is caused by inadequate cooling, and the patient usually has a very high temperature, and his sweating ceases, usually for 24 to 72 hours.

IN MOST CASES, rapid reduction of body temperature with an ice bath and massage of the extremities will improve the victim's circulation and hasten recovery.

Campers and other persons participating in outdoor activities are exposed to many conditions which may cause immediate or delayed allergic emergencies.

Among the most serious of these are poisonous bites and stings, caused by insects and reptiles, and animal bites. Insects and reptile bites kill many people in the U.S. each year, and rabies, a fatal viral infection of the nervous system, which is transmitted to man by animal bites is always a possible threat to campers.
