### Home Starts

(Continued from Page 1-A) home starts made. The Oakland County hike over the first half of last year ran 27.6 percent. The county had 3,021 home starts last year compared to 2,368 the first half of last year.

MACOMB County showed a 17.3 percent increase and issued a total of 3,218 residential unit permits. Wayne County, excluding Detroit, issued 2,716 family unit permits for a 37.5 percent increase over last year. Detroit proper, however, had only 1,035 permits for a 27.7 decrease from last year and dropped the Wayne County as a whole increase total to a mere 2-10ths of a percent.

It was brought out in the report that for the second year in a row there has been a very substantial increase in the number of apartment building units put under construction in the Detroit area.

Comparing the whole Detroit Metropolitan Area figures for the first six months of this year and the same period last year, an approximately 11 percent increase in home and apartment unit buildings is shown. The 10,449 permits issued the first half of this year is 1,078 more than was issued during the first six months of 1952.

Now to a little serious business. Have you read the Township Ordinance posted twice in the past weeks under Legal Notices in the Farmington Enterprise? If not, Ordinance No. 31 passed by the Township applies to any subdivision being served either by public or private water systems. It decrees: If fire protection is hampered by low water pressures, the Township may by resolution prohibit the use of water from such systems for sprinkling, washing of automobiles; and for any other purpose not directly connected

with ordinary domestic purposes of the residence. The resolution was passed on July 8, and becomes effective henceforth, August 10, 1953.

**VIOLATION OF ANY** resolution passed by the Township misdemeanor and upon conviction subject to a fine of \$100 or imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail, not to exceed 90 days. So, govern yourselves accordingly. Think of your neighbors and also of the tinder dry woods we had a week ago and could have set off a series of fires that if the pressure were down, could not be controlled. Necessary legal action to permit the Beechview Swim Club to go ahead with the construction of a public service drive along the west edge of the Beechview School site was taken by the Farmington Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night.

The action was taken subject to confirmation on approval of the plan for the roadway by the county road commission. The School Board also asked that the swim club give some reasonable assurances that it or other ditching will be provided along the roadway to assure that flooding onto the school playground area will not result.

Byron Oliver, an administrative assistant in the school district, gave a report to the Board on the grading work presently being done on the school property, and adjoining swim club land.
