Named to Dean List at Miami University

Miss Alice L. Polley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Polley of 28400 Brandywine Drive in Farmington, has been named to the Deans' List at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio.

The Miami University Deans' List for the spring semester, comprised of all undergraduates who achieved averages of B or above for a course-load of 12 hours or more, totals 2,049 names.

The list represents undergraduate students only, and these amounted to 7,363 of the 7,812 registered on the Oxford campus. Therefore, 27.8 per cent of Miami's undergraduates achieved academic averages of B or above.

ON THE LIST are 95 students with 40 or slightly above for "Highest Honor"; 498 with "High Honor" for grades between 3.5 and 3.75, and 1,450 other passing averages of 2.50 (credits) to 3.49 for "Honor" listing.

Although men outnumbered women in the semester's total undergraduate enrollment of 8,821, the women were in a substantial majority on the Deans' List. They were ahead 69 to 35 among the Straight A's; 214 to 184 in the "High Honor" bracket; and 804 to 652 in the "Honor" bracket.
