### Aids Navajo Indian Youth

Mr. J. Clancy Day, 26682, Westmore Farmington, is sponsoring, Ben, a 13-year-old Navajo Indian boy from Chippewah, N. E. Mexico, through Save the Children Federation, the international child welfare organization, it was announced today by Dallas Johnson, Director of the organization's American Indian program. The sponsorship will provide the child with funds for clothing, school supplies, personal care and spending money with which to participate in school activities and thereby hasten his integration into the student body of his school.

MR. JOHNSON states: "American Indian children are striving for education. Proudly conscious of their cultural heritage, they are eager to bring their talents and skills into the mainstream of American life. Sponsorship will help this American Indian child build a richer happier life. Most important to the child is the realization that someone cares so much about his welfare."

Sponsors receive a photograph and history of the youngsters they help and periodic progress reports from the Federation and they enjoy a warm person-to-person relationship with the child through an exchange of letters.

Founded in 1922, Save the Children Federation aids children through sponsorships, family, school and community self-help projects, the self-help scholarship fund and the annual collection of used clothing. The Federation, whose national headquarters is in New Haven, Connecticut, helps American Indian children, children in the Southern Appalachian Mountains and in 17 countries overseas.

An individual, school or group need contribute only \$10 a month to sponsor an American Indian child.
