SWIFT STRIKE III pits two task forces against each other in a four-week mock war and includes airborne maneuvers, long-distance flights, air-ground support missions and counter-guerrilla operations.

ROBSON is assigned as a platoon leader in the 1st Airborne Battle Group of the 101st Airborne Division's 327th Infantry at Fort Campbell, Ky.
