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Scuttle Plans For Industrial Road This Year

Plans to have an industrial roadway completely around the industrial area now being developed in the City of Farmington east of Farmington Road and north of Eight Mile completed this year have now been scuttled.

After lengthy discussion at the regular Council meeting August 19, councilmen voted against going ahead with the project at this time despite a recommendation from the city manager that he felt they should.

There were two basic reasons for the Council decision against proceeding now. One was due to the fact that the bids for the work came in almost 60 percent higher than the original cost estimate that had been made. The other stems from the fact that it would not be possible to complete the whole project at this time anyway since one of the principal industries already revealed that it would not be able to come up with its share of the money for the job at this time.

The project was to have been done on a 50-50 basis with the city standing half the cost for the loop service road around the industrial plant development and the benefiting property owners the other half.

The project, which the city manager stated should be very beneficial in helping to attract new industry to this location, will now be delayed until at least 1954.

Only Councilman Hugo Peterson voted in favor of going ahead with the work now.

Delay Action on Dance Permit

It appears that the City Council will be in favor of granting a dance permit to the Gay Way Bar on Grand River Ave. downtown only if the owner can assure that the dancing will be well controlled.

This was the impression given during the course of discussion of this matter at the regular Council meeting Monday night, August 19.

In a written report to the Council, the city attorney stated that he felt the city would be better off to grant the permit under state law than set up a special city ordinance governing dancing places. He pointed out that the state would revoke a dancing license for any establishment at any time that the governing body requested it and that no specific violations needed to be cited to get them to do this.

Councilmen seemed to be agreeable to this but felt they should first have details regarding where dancing would be allowed, how often big dances were planned and other details. Mayor Robert Lindbert was of the opinion that dancing should be allowed only in a roped-off area away from the table area.

The city manager was instructed to meet with the bar owner and get a floor plan of the establishment showing exactly where dancing is to be allowed. He was also asked to get agreements with regard to the kind of dances planned, the hours proposed and similar information.

Long Illness Proves Fatal
