Receive Grant From Federal Government for Dormitory

A \$90,000 dollar check, the federal government loan, was received by Sister M. Raymond, CSSR, president of Madonna College, from the Housing and Home Finance Agency in Chicago.

The money is designated for the construction of the dormitory and cafeteria which are near completion. With the arrival of the students on Sept. 16, dormitories will be ready for occupancy.

The second stage of the \$2 million expansion program is now under way. The overall program involves construction of a 112,000 square foot complex to be situated on a 49-acre site of the present 330-acre campus. The first phase will provide 112,000 square feet for a student dormitory which will house 250 students, cafeteria for 450, faculty residences, and a guest house.

Present construction will add 300,000 square feet for academic facilities including an administration building, student activities area, 100,000-volume library, classrooms, faculty offices, science, home economics laboratories and music and art areas.

DESIGNED BY Robert L. Svoboda Associates, Architects, the new Madonna College facilities are a blend of pre-cast concrete and aluminum which is to create a contemporary design. Darin & Armstrong, Inc., is the general contractor for the dormitory and cafeteria; Brennan and Company, for the academic section. The target date for completion is earmarked for fall of 1965.

Madonna College, located at 96800 Schoolcraft, Livonia, has been in existence for 16 years. It is a fully-accredited, four-year liberal arts college owned and operated by the Felician Sisters and is open to all young women regardless of race, color or creed. Upon completion of its current building program, the college will be geared for enrollment up to 1,000 students.
