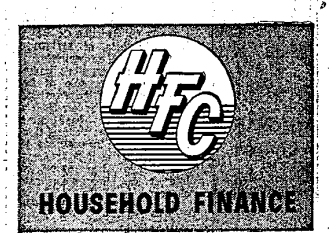
Antique Car Club Has Sunday Outing

Book Planned By Journalist

Former area resident, Russell Lawrence, will visit his family in Farmington September 16-21. Lawrence who is employed by the Philadelphia Inquirer newspaper will be here gathering information for a book that he is writing about his grandfather, Samuel Cook of Farmington (1848-1919). The book will cover the years from Samuel's birth at Isle of Guernsey, England, through his election as Michigan Senator from the Fourth District (1897-1898).

POLITICALLY active in Wayne County, Michigan, Samuel was elected Department Commander for the Grand Army of the Republic, Michigan Division.

He served in the Civil War at age 16 and saw action in many of the major battles. When discharged from the Civil War, Samuel joined General George Custer's famous Indian Fighting 7th Cavalry.

He left Custer and returned to Detroit in 1872 to marry his childhood sweetheart. It was four years later that Custer faced Cattle Sighting Bull at the Little Big Horn.

THE MICHIGAN Historical Society has shown interest and has helped in researching Samuel's life. Lawrence hopes to complete the book by June of 1964 when he will submit it for publication.

Thomas W. Veach, Jr., son of Mrs. Leola M. Veach of Maple and Stone Harbor, New Jersey, will accompany Mr. Lawrence. Mr. Veach is employed by the Michigan Department of the Philadelphia Inquirer.
