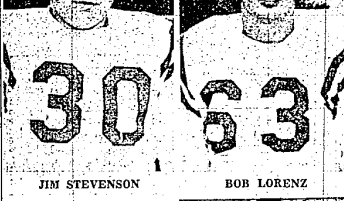

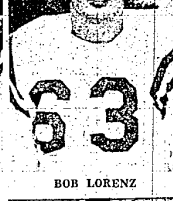

The awards will be presented to both Detroit firms at the annual convention of the National Association of Home Builders in Chicago, December 11-15.

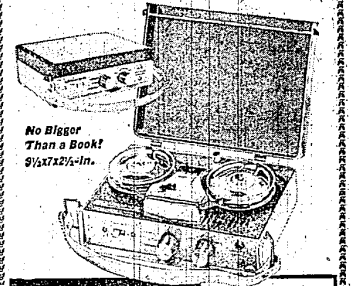
