WSU Professor Talks to AAUW

"In 1910 over half of the population of America was rural, but in 1950, close to 70 percent lived in cities and towns. So stated Dr. Robert Mowitz, professor of political science at Wayne State University, as he addressed a meeting of the Women's Association of University Women in the Farmington Senior High band room, Wednesday, November 20.

The speaker then listed some major factors conditioning the growth and development of a metropolitan area. He mentioned such as the location, available science and technology (for what would we do without electricity?), and most important, value of the land. He stressed maximizing the values of subsystem components you can destroy the over-all system."

He concluded the speech with a summary of the recently published book, "Profile of 3 Metropolis," which states that although the metropolis is composed of a complex of many governmental units, there is very little likelihood that it will be replaced with a single government for the metropolis.

(Continued from Page 1-A) what was ahead for them after graduation if they had had more guidance services in school. A total of 41 expressed a desire for more vocational guidance; 32 wanted more personal counseling and 33 more information about test interpretations.

Between 1957 and the present date the guidance department has been expanded since it is not the feeling of administrators and teachers alike is that even better guidance services must be provided by the school district.

A number of students answering the questionnaire felt there was a need for more commercial training in the schools and that typing training had proven very beneficial for them. Those who went on to college rated general business training and oral English training which they had received in high school as being most beneficial for them.

Kimberley, Area Safety Groups Meet to Air Safety Problems

The Farmington Area Safety Committee, composed of Irving Yakes, Township Chief of Police, Floyd Cairns, Township Clerk, Leland Gilford, President of the Board of Education, and Byron Oliver, Administrator, met on Thursday, November 24, with representatives from the Beechview PTA and South Kimberley Subdivision in addition to Kimberley and Farmington.

(2) That police be on duty in the area both in the morning and the afternoon. (3) That there be adult crossing guards on duty. (4) That the no passing zones in Middlebelt in the area be extended. (5) That passing on the shoulders be prohibited. (6) That school signs be erected in the area in Middlebelt. (7) That the 45 MPH sign in front of the school be removed. (8) That blinker lights be put on the portable school signs used on Middlebelt during the home students are going to or from the school. (9) That the speed limit in the area of the school be lowered to 25 MPH on Middlebelt. (10) That the safety committee meet with the students of the junior high at the school to give safety instructions.

FLOYD CAIRNS agreed to walk on his property. He should do a walkway along the Middlebelt boundary of South Kimberley Subdivision. Cairns also agreed to contact Jerry Cerce, owner of the property from Twelve Mile to Eleven Mile fronting on Middlebelt, about constructing a driveway on his property. In addition, Chief Yakes promised to check more closely on Middlebelt speeders in the area of the school.

The Kimberley Safety Committee has for some time been greatly concerned at the severe safety hazards confronting the students who must walk on Middlebelt to the East Junior High School. The committee feels very gratified to have re-

Arrest Youth For B & E in City

Farmington City Police arrested a 17-year-old Ulicia Michigan youth November 20 after he had broken into Mack's Hardware at 33320 Eight Mile Road.

The petition, to be prepared by Oliver, will be presented to the Oakland County Road Commission asking three corrective measures: (1) One of these will be that the speed limit on Middlebelt in the area of the East Junior High School be reduced. (2) That the no passing zone be erected along the route; and (3) That a stop light be erected either at Eleven Mile and Middlebelt in front of the East Junior High School.

Oliver was found inside the building by Officer Bill Berning attempting to hide behind a wrecker. The youth pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering during the night time and was examined in Farmington Municipal Court. He was bound over for trial in Oakland County Circuit Court and held at \$2,000. His trial examination date has been set for December 9.

In addition, the Kimberley Committee asked for a number of other corrective measures. General satisfaction was expressed by those surveyed with the labor supply in the community, local communication facilities and the city government.
