Contestants In Math Prize Competition

Two Farmington Senior High seniors, by getting at least 17 out of 40 problems right on the first part of the Michigan Math Prize competition, are qualified to take the second part Thursday, December 12. Bob Lord and Mike Gale, both of whom have been in the advanced Math League since its inception, placed in the upper four per cent of all who took the first part of the test, thus qualified to take Part II.

The results of Part II will be revealed sometime in the middle of January. Both students stated that they did care of the problems, but neither will vouch that they are correct. If either answered the three they did correctly, they should have attained a very high score.

Although there are no scholarships directly given for outstanding achievement for these students, the Michigan Math Prize programs take into consideration the fact that a student distinguished himself in the test.

It is the third year Gale has qualified and taken the second part of the test, and Lord's first.

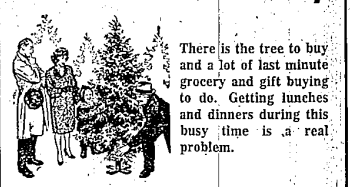

Early Efforts Next Year Will Be Needed

The Christmas lighting and decorating of our major streets in the business sections leaves much to be desired this year but a start has at least been made to improve this situation.

Each year for the past few years now the amount and quality of Christmas decorations has been diminishing and little was being done up until this year to improve this condition.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Board of Directors of the new Board of Commerce in November and it was decided to initiate a crash program to see what system could be worked out to at least get a few more decorations up this year.

Approximately \$700 taken from the treasury of the Board of Commerce along with two or three hundred dollars contributed through a direct solicitation has resulted in a little more than the way of decorations having been able to be purchased and installed at this time.

It's only a beginning and we strongly hope that the needed follow through will be made next year to get a lot more decorations up and really make the community attractive on the holiday time.

We know it's mighty hard to think about Christmas and community decorations for the Yule season in the middle of the summer or early fall. It's going to take an organized planning and fund raising effort around this time this coming year and for the next few years to come as we're ever going to have a real attractively decorated community around holiday time again.

We hope the Board of Commerce and a lot of business people will put a circle around a date sometime between May and September on their new 1964 calendars and make a note to check on what is being done to get a Christmas decorating and fund raising project into motion.
