## Early Efforts Next Year Will Be Needed

## Contestants In Math Prize Competition

Two Farmington Senior High seniors, by getting at least 1 out of 40 problems right on the first part of the Michigan Math Prize Competition test, qualified to take the second part.

Bob Lord and Mike Gale, both of whom have been in the Advanced Math Program since its conception, placed in the upper four per cent of all who took the first part of the test and thus qualified to take Part II.

The results of Part II will be revealed sometime in the middle of January. Both students stated that they did care of the problems, but neither will know that they are correct. If either answered the three they had correctly, they shall have a very high score.

Although the competition is not officially given for outstanding achievement for these tests, many scholarship programs take into consideration the fact that a student distinguishes himself in the test.

This is the third year Gale and Lord have taken the second part of the test, and Lord first.

Michigan Bell Engineer Gets More Training

G. Richard Rice of 32275 Shrewsbury, Farmington, an engineer with the Michigan Telephone Company, will be attending a special regional Communications Engineering School at the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago.

The advanced college training course was developed to prepare telephone company engineers for the job of providing communications services in the future.

Rice is among 250 Bell System engineers throughout the country who were selected for the advanced training on the basis of competitive examination performance on a job placement application or a study preparatory course on engineering and related subjects.

The engineers alternately attend college for a month and then return to regular work assignments, with the entire course lasting about a year.

The training programs are being conducted at four locations in the United States and one in Canada. Classes will be started next year at two other U.S. col-

leges.
