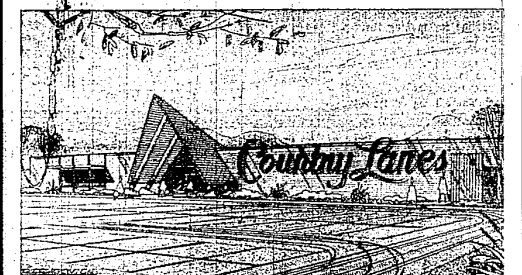
Shangri-La carries jet-powered attack aircraft and can provide a strategic mobile landing base constantly on guard against any threat to world peace.

'64 Maps to Be Off Press Soon

The Michigan State Highway Department has started taking orders for the 1964 Official Michigan Highway Map.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said the new map will be off the press by mid-March.

Mackie said persons writing for maps now — and he urged them to use post cards — will receive them as soon as they arrive from the printer.

Hundreds of changes have been made on the map since last year, mainly the result of new freeways that have been opened to traffic. Michigan now has more than 1,150 miles of freeway.

Freeway strip maps on the backside of this year's maps have been expanded to include 108 between Holland and Benton Harbor; 175 from Madison Heights to Flint and 394 between Mt. Clemens and Port Huron. The strip maps show the location of on-and-off ramps of each interchange.

Mackie said 800,000 maps will be printed by Michigan Lithographic Company of Grand Rapids.

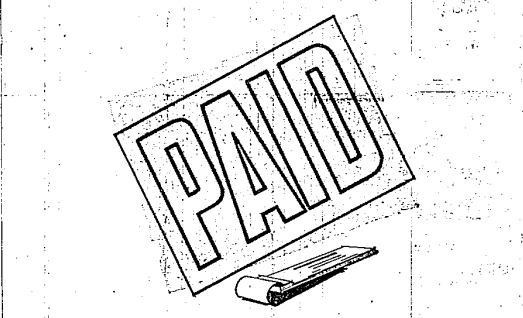
