### Record 14th Traffic Death in Farmington

The traffic safety record in Farmington was marred over the holidays as the Township recorded its fourteenth fatality of 1963 on New Year's Eve, with the death of a 38-year-old woman who was a passenger in one of two cars which crashed head-on in an accident at 12 Mile and Lincolnville.

Mrs. Joyce Jean Antoucci of 21475 Duns Scotus in Southfield was pronounced dead on arrival at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak after her husband's car collided with an oncoming car while attempting a left hand turn onto Lincolnville from 12 Mile Road.

SEVERELY injured in the two-car crash were both drivers, Olimpo Antoucci, 40, and Raymond J. Redilla, 16, of 2838 W. 12 Mile Rd. in Farmington Township.

A one-year-old child, Andrew Antoucci, a passenger in his parents' car, was also seriously injured. All of the injured were treated at William Beaumont Hospital.

Redilla's car was heading east on 12 Mile Road when the Antoucci car, which had been traveling west on 12 Mile, attempted the left turn at Lincolnville, just west of Inkster Road in Farmington Township.

The 14 traffic fatalities during the six-month period of January 1, 1963, until December 31, 1963, by far outstripped the number of traffic deaths ever recorded in a single year in Farmington Township.
