LEGAL NOTICE

AMENDMENT OF ANTI-BLIGHT ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 22 entitled: "An Ordinance to prevent, reduce or eliminate blight, blighting factors or causes of blight within Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, to provide for the enforcement hereof; and to provide penalties for the violation hereof."

THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

A. That the following section 2A is added to the Ordinance No. 32 captioned above:

Section 2A. Non-Residential Causes of Blight.

The causes of blight or blighting factors set forth above as applicable areas are hereby determined to be causes of blight or blighting factors and subject to the provisions of this Ordinance if located in areas 2 or 3 or other than residential areas, unless such uses of property are incidental to and necessary for the carrying out of any business or occupation lawfully being carried on upon the property in question.

B. That this Amendment Ordinance shall be published within ten days from the enactment hereof and shall become effective thirty days after publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

D. E. Stromback Promoted At Burroughs Corporation

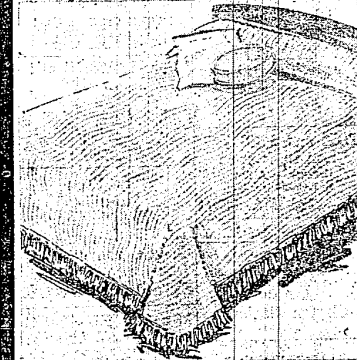
