Pulling Lot of Voters' Names

As of this week, the names of 255 registered voters in the City of Farmington are being pulled from the voter registration books, the treasurer's office reported Tuesday.

Under provisions of the new state constitution, voters are required to cast ballots every two years or get reinstated. Those who do not are scratched as registered voters.

Complying with the new state law, Clerk Treva Quinn sent out voter suspension notices on December 13 to 380 on the registration books who had not voted for two years. Only 125 still living here returned cards indicating that they still wanted to hold their right to vote locally.

In the Township, over 2,500 suspension notices were sent out. They went out a little later than the deadline for getting cards returned is, as a result, today, Thursday, January 16, the latest word from Township Clerk Floyd Cairns was that in very substantial percentage of names are going to have to be taken off the Township's voter registration books also.

Medical Facts Revealed About Heart Trouble

During pregnancy, the mother's heart works extra hard. Even when she is resting, her heart must pump extra blood to supply her growing baby as well as to meet the needs of her own body. What about the woman with "heart trouble"?

Contrary to widespread belief, today most young women with a disease or defect of the heart can safely bear children, according to a newly revised booklet, "Heart Disease and Pregnancy," published by the American Heart Association.

STRESSING the importance of proper medical care, the booklet notes that doctors today are better equipped than ever before to care for pregnant women with heart disease. Surgery can now improve or correct many inborn heart defects as well as heart damage from rheumatic fever, the most common type of heart disease. Young women. However, the booklet points out that heart operations are not always necessary.

Fourteen frequently asked questions are answered in a section entitled "What Women Want to Know About Heart Disease and Pregnancy." Examples: "Will my baby inherit my heart disease?" Answer: "It is most unlikely. There is no evidence that most heart disease is inherited."

"Will my baby have to be born by Caesarean Section?" Answer: "No... There is every likelihood that your baby will be delivered normally." Additional questions and answers deal with the possibility of worsening heart disease, size of family, pre-natal and post-natal care, special diets and other subjects.

The booklet concludes with a recommendation that a young woman who has heart disease and is planning to be married should talk it over with her future husband and her doctor. "Don't risk your happiness by hiding the fact you have heart disease," it states.

Before the guidance director talked to him, Peter sat in class and paid little attention to what was taking place. He exerted even less energy in his studies. Tests given to him by the school counselor revealed the youngster to be a potentially bright student. The counselor talked to Peter and his parents and told them of the child's actual abilities and how he might use them. Gradually, an improvement in Peter's study habits and grades became evident.
