### Accident Pay Policy for Twp. Employees Set

The Farmington Township Board established a firm policy on employee pay benefits in cases where the employee falls under the workman's compensation program of accident insurance.

It was the feeling of the Board that the employee should be made in an amount to that when added with compensation allowance it equals two-thirds of their normal salary.

The straight two-thirds across-the-board pay schedule would be effective for three months following an employee's absence from work under the compensation program and pay would be discontinued at the end of the three-month period.

### FIRE SWEEP THROUGH THIS Farmington Township home Tuesday afternoon, January 14, but fortunately none of the family of six were in the home at the time.

will follow a peninsula out into the lake to a shrine. The form of the shrine which embraces a sculptured statue of Our Lady of Mercy is strongly related to the predominant design of the main chapel.

On the west bank of the lake will be the location of the new Lady of Mercy High School designed to accommodate 1,500 girls.

This facility will be relatively self-sustaining since it includes a convent for 40 teaching Sisters, a chapel, an administrative unit, a gymnasium and a pool, an auditorium and cafeteria and kitchen in addition to the basic learning areas which are uniquely planned for core-curriculum and team-teaching activities.

Although each building will have its own character, there will be a unifying impression to the campus resulting from the effective employment of building materials, the discreet use of a colonnade of concrete arches, and the linking of retaining walls aided by a warmth of landscaping.

GENERAL CONTRACTORS for this multi-million dollar project are James and Salvage assisted by Broker Elettage Co., Inc. and Lorne Plumbing and Heating Co. Financing will be secured by the Sisters of Mercy through loans, savings and donations.

Occupancy is scheduled for January, 1965. The Sisters of Mercy will celebrate the 25th anniversary of the transfer of their provincial headquarters to the Detroit area in June, 1965. The Mercy order was founded by Mother Mary Catherine McAuley in 1851 in Dublin, Ireland and has been active in Michigan in the fields of teaching and nursing since 1873.

The Province of Detroit is one of the nine provinces of the amalgamation of over 7,000 Religious Sisters of Mercy in the United States and South America.

### Deny Plea for Pay by Union

By a split vote of 4-3 the Farmington Board of Education Monday night rejected an appeal from the union representing custodians in the school district for pay for their employees who were off work on Nov. 23 to mourn the death of President Kennedy.

School was not held that day and none of the system's staff worked. Acting under present policy, none of the hourly rated employees in the district were paid.

The Union for Public Employees representing approximately 30 custodians on the school system's staff contends that their members and all hourly employees should have been paid for this day off or have been allowed to work that day even though school was not in session.

Present policy calls for pay for all hourly employees on only six holidays during the year and the majority of the board felt that this policy should be strictly adhered to.

The three who felt pay should be granted were President Leonard Clifford, Secretary Barbara Brown and Trustee Patricia Dates.

Virgil Anderson, representing the Metropolitan Council of the Union of Public Employees, and Earl Billings, president of Local 1948, appeared before the Board to argue their case. Several employees who are in the union were also in the audience to hear the discussion on this matter.

ed to include service to Westland and the Kendallwood area. Another part of that question was whether the project now initially under way could be extended to include the subdivisions farther to the north.

Farmington Township Supervisor Curt Hall answered questions by saying the proposed 14 Mile Road transmission line would be built as soon as it is indicated to the satisfaction of the Detroit Water Board that property owners want the service. "All they need is customers," Hall said.

### Seek Sidewalk Easement Help

The Farmington Township Board was requested by the Board of Education for the Farmington School District to cooperate in gaining an easement for the east side of Middlebelt Road between the Flamingo Trailer Park, just north of Nine Mile Road, to the East Junior High School, between Ten and 11 Mile roads.

The School Board wants the easement right established for the purpose of providing students with a walkway to and from school along the busy thoroughfare.

Township officials said they would prepare a survey for a possible easement route and prepare a list of the property owners of record who would need to be contacted prior to establishing a walkway for the students.

The breakdown on the Township's building activity in 1963 was as follows: a single family home permit valued at \$3,000,000 issued for the new Holsford mobile home hospital, construction, north of Grand River near Eight Mile Road, also considerably boosted the Township's building activity total in 1963.

Not counting the new hospital, which can't be figured on the Township tax roll, there were 12 additional commercial permits issued last year valued at \$128,200. A total of 12 additional values of \$55,065; 118 garage permits valued at \$142,800; and 2 swimming pools valued at \$18,800, rounded out the Township's building activity for 1963.

development proposed by the Thompson-Brown Co. north of 13 Mile between the North Farmington High School and the Bond elementary school.

DEVELOPMENT of between 120 and 150 acres in this area is proposed with between 275 and 330 houses called for on the preliminary plan. It was indicated that the homes proposed here would be in the \$25,000 to \$30,000 price range.

The preliminary plans for this development have not yet been officially submitted to the Township for consideration but are expected to be at the regular meeting of the Township Zoning Board on Thursday, January 22.

A go-ahead on this development will result in the need for a lot more classrooms at both the secondary and elementary grade levels.

The Board agreed that they should delay any detailed discussion on these plans until they have been formally presented to the Township for approval.

### Math Workshop At Elementary Level Planned

Some 200 elementary teachers from the Farmington School District will attend an arithmetic workshop on January 24 at the Ten Mile Elementary School.

Keynote speaker will be the nationally recognized elementary math authority, Miss Elida Merton, co-author of the Holt, Rinehart and Winston arithmetic books. Appearing with Miss Merton will be the arithmetic consultant for her publishing company, E. E. Swor.

THE FARMINGTON School District arithmetic committee headed by Jack Cleveland, principal of the Alameda Elementary School, has also arranged for the guests to meet with principals following their presentations and discuss ways in which their ideas might be applicable here in the Farmington school system.

Classes are being conducted at North Farmington High School by Dr. David Wells, Oakland County Mathematics Consultant, to offer elementary school teachers here another phase of the continuing program to improve classroom sides and techniques.

Principals from the School District are also involved in a series of meetings on mathematics, and after-school grade-level meetings are being held regularly for all teachers as part of the overall plan of exploratory study of new math programs.

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
