MOTION by Duke, supported by Bassette, that the Township Board of the Township of Farmington declare its intention to proceed with preliminary engineering for Detroit water in Stannan Acres, Farmington Hills, and Glen Orchard Subdivisions and parcels in the general area which desire water facilities, and hereby directs Pate, Hinn & Boxer, registered professional engineers, to prepare plans showing the improvement mentioned, the location thereof, and an estimate of the cost thereof.
