When information was given to voters prior to the \$5 million school bond issue election which was balloted on in November of 1963, there was no mention made of a combination classroom-auditorium even being considered with moneys from the bond issue. It was indicated that an estimated \$1,260,000 would be spent to meet, costs for the construction, equipping and paying of architectural fees for 24 additional classrooms at East Junior High and an equal number at North Farmington High.

To provide an auditorium that can have the multiple function of being used for classrooms during much of the time is without a doubt a very economical way is totally wrong unless it is clearly spelled out to the tappayers who are going to pay the bill that this is how their money is going to be spent.

Perhaps a majority of the voters would be in total agreement that; this would be a good expenditure but they should have the right to say so on the ballot. The estimated \$80,000 to \$100,000 additional cost for the auditorium-classroom combination school section would provide a substantial amount of additional regular classroom space.

We feel voters would have every right in the world to object vigorously if members of the board of education decide to go ahead with the plan for the combination classroom-auditorium section in the North Farmington High addition.




