Farmington Dairy Offering New, Modern Plastic Caps on Bottles

Joseph Himmelsbach, long-time Farmington Dairy Co. proprietor announced this week that his firm has completed arrangements with the Esalright Company of Fulton, N.Y. for the use of a completely new idea in milk bottle capping and protection.

Beginning Monday, April 13, all milk bottles from Farmington Dairy will be protected with a new allplastic milk bottle cap. The sanitary milk bottle cap, according to Himmelsbach, replaces the former type of closure that the dairy has been using.

Citing some of the advantages of this new type of closure for glass bottles he pointed out that the milk bottle can be opened very easily, by hand instead of using special openers. One of its many other important features is that the bottle can be recapped in the home without any difficulty, after it has been put on in the dairy.

IN THE INITIAL capping the Plast-Cap cannot be put on the bottle by hand but must be forced over the bottle rim by special equipment. Once on, however, the special cap can be easily removed and replaced.

Use of the "Plast-Cap" by Farmington Dairy is one of the earliest in the country and is another convenience and sanitary service, according to Himmelsbach, being provided its milk customers in this area.

The Plast-Cap is an ingeniously designed milk bottle cap that keeps milk and bottle tops totally sanitary, clean, and remarkably free of messy milk leaks—no matter how many times it is removed and replaced.
