ington Township will be a one-story structure faced with extruded aluminum, and will be designed by Diamond National's Research and Engineering Department.

"The new plant will triple our present production," said the township engineer. "The first stage of our program will provide employment for approximately 100 highly skilled engineers and technicians. The site was selected after careful studies based upon geographical location and accessibility to its markets and availability of a large source of skilled manpower. We're looking forward to enlarging our membership in the area's industrial base and contributing to its economic progress."

ORDINANCE NO. 18D THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON

A. That Ordinance No. 18, service charges on sewer, effective June 5, 1959, as amended by the addition of Section 8 to read as follows:

SECTION 8: At the time a permit is applied for to connect any property within the Township of Farmington to any public sewer or drain, the cost of which shall have been specially assessed against said property by either said township or the County of Oakland, there shall be added to the amount collected from the owner of said property or the applicant for a connection permit an additional connection charge, in addition to the other charges above provided in this ordinance, which charge shall be equal to the aggregate amount, including interest and penalties, or installments of special assessments against said property for said public sewer or drain which are then due and unpaid, whether or not special assessments are made against said property at the time a lien on said property is made. The proceeds of said additional connection charges shall be deposited in the general fund of the township and shall reimburse such general fund to the extent available, for any advances made or to be made therefrom for the township in fulfillment of its pledge of its full faith and credit in connection with any contractual or bonded obligations of the township incurred in anticipation of the payment of said special assessments.

B. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication.

small in size and cheaply constructed which would devalue the home values nearby more than a good class of office buildings there.

Councilman Howard Thayer stated that he had talked with a number of real estate men regarding this matter and that they had all agreed they did not feel the kind of offices proposed would devalue surrounding home values.

Councilman Hugo Peterson stated that with the five-foot high green belt which was required as well as very substantial open area between the offices proposed and adjoining residential property, it didn't seem how residential properties in the area could be decreased in value.

**COUNCILMAN FORREST**

Councilman Forrest stated that Mrs. Alton Loma, who owns property valued at between \$2 and \$3 million in the city and that the wishes of these homeowners should be considered. He also held that the developer should have included this 1.2-acre parcel in Alta Loma Subdivision at the time it was developed and not 'left it out to be developed later. Another point made by him was the fact that there had been some talk about an interest in the expressway in this area and that nothing should be done in developing this land until it is clearly determined where such a route might go.

**WHAT BUILDING TO BE**

allowed on this small problem parcel of land has been a topic of heated debate for the past several months now. An initial request to re-zone the property to permit apartment units there was rejected by the council.

The requested change to the R-1-O classification followed this initial zoning change rejection. Plans were submitted for a single story architect designed building and other office units of a similar nature for possible development on the 1.2-acre parcel later.

That percentage of homeowners in Alta Loma who opposed the apartments first proposed, and were successful in getting re-zoning for this area of land rejected, voiced equally as strong opposition to re-zoning of the land for controlled office development. Their contention was that the only use this land should ever be put to was for single family homes.

The planning commission was fine to hold this contention was unreasonable and voted 5-1 to recommend to the council that the R-1-O re-zoning be requested be granted.

Also objected to in the petition was the loudness of the public address system being used by the new store in announcing clerks and making announcements of various kinds.

Another complaint, not in the petition, was that the plan, voiced at the meeting by Ivan B. Clarke who was one of the petition signers, was that bright lights being used to illuminate the outdoor green and shrub areas were also causing annoyance to nearby homeowners.

His request was that the store also be asked to use less brilliant lights for this purpose and turn them out at a reasonable hour at night.

The council instructed the city manager to contact the manager of the Frank's Store in the Plaza and take necessary steps to get the matters which are annoying to the nearby homeowners corrected. He was asked to report back to the councilmen at the next regular meeting on the solutions to the problems that had been worked out.

The General Citizens Youth Guidance Committee of Great Farmington met on Monday evening, April 20, and took action on case work handled by committee members since their last regular meeting.

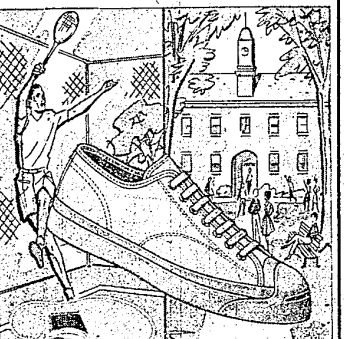
A total of 11 out of 22 old cases involving Farmington youths were dropped and 11 new cases were added, keeping the number still under the need for guidance at 22.
