Farmington Dist. Library Survey Results Reported

The Farmington District Library is one of 271 public libraries in Michigan which participated in the first state-wide survey on public library use ever conducted in the state, according to Genevieve St. Cassey, State Librarian.

The survey, conducted during the week of February 10, showed that over a million people use Michigan's public libraries every week, borrowing from collections totaling over 10 million volumes and using the reference and other special services available.

STATE-WIDE, the survey showed that more than 615,000 elementary and high school students, or one-out-of-three enrolled in Michigan's public and parochial schools, use public libraries every week, in addition to college and university students or one-out-of-three who attend Michigan's 69 colleges and universities.

Farmington results showed that of 2,120 patrons surveyed, 897 were elementary students, 680 high school, and 43 college and university.

State-wide, over 135,000 men and women in business, industry, communications and the professions walk into our libraries every week. Other weekly patrons include 20,000 retirees and 3,000 unemployed.

IN FARMINGTON, 146 patrons were in business, industry, communications and the professions in addition to 391 housewives, 17 retirees and one unemployed.

State-wide, the survey showed that personal use was the major reason most people use the library. School use was second, followed by job-related reasons. In Farmington, 1,265 persons used personal use, 1,132 school use and 108 came into the library for job-related reasons.

The total state picture showed the child age bracket was the 6-to-18 year olds, followed by men and women in the 22-to-40 age group. Adults 41-to-60 were next, followed by ages 18-to-21 and 61 and older. Lowest age group was the 4-to-6 year old.

THE RESULTS AT the Farmington Library showed 1,375 in the 6-18 group, 40 in the 19-21 group, 423 in the 22-40 group,

She pointed out six areas in which parents and teachers need to gain information. They are: "What is normal in kids of various ages;" "How can we develop moral values;" "How to enjoy work;" "What does the impact of father-mother relationships have on children;" "How do we educate children;" and "Sex education of children."

These could be used as program topics for future meetings.
