

MRS. JOHN H. THAYER, 84, died at 10:30 p.m. Monday, July 22, 1964, at the Farmington Hospital following a brief illness. She was 94 years old.

Mrs. Thayer was born in England on February 2, 1870, the daughter of Joseph and Mary Hill Davis. She came to this country as a child and lived and attended school in New Hudson, Michigan. On September 6, 1894, she was united in marriage to John H. Thayer in Farmington. She had three children: John H. Thayer, Jr., who died in 1958; Mrs. Thayer was one of the oldest members of the First Methodist Church of Farmington having joined the church in 1901.

Funeral services took place on Saturday at 2 p.m. from the Thayer Funeral Home with Rev. Richard T. Mackham officiating. Interment was in Oakwood Cemetery.

She is survived by one son, Edward D. Thayer of Farmington and one sister, Mrs. Thillie Baum of Pontiac. She also leaves four grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren. Her husband, John H. Thayer and a daughter Mrs. Luola Pajal preceded her in death.

Lawrence Tech Can Now Enroll 4,000 Students Under Expansion

There'll be room for 500 additional day college students at the Lawrence Institute of Technology this fall. This is surprising news in view of the crowded conditions generally faced by students trying to enter colleges and universities.

But Lawrence Tech has planned it that way as added space in the new library group of three buildings now permits greater classroom facilities. Wanting a new paving program provides 12 acres of free parking lots for students. Thus the college, located on a 58-acre campus at North Western Highway and Ten Mile Road, will be able to handle approximately 4,000 this fall in day and night sessions. Officials expect a 1,500 enrollment in day school and 2,500 at night.
