door, indoor pool and tennis courts.

Also proposed as a part of the total development is a neighborhood type shopping circle of about 15 exclusive shops to serve not only the residents of the immediate area but also visitors at the Holiday Inn. It is planned to design the shopping circle as a village green with a large green circular area in the center having a band box and old carvings located in it to give authenticity to the old fashioned village green setting. Thomas Duke said.

DUKE pointed out that a more than adequate amount of parking area would be called for around the shopping circle.

The schedule, as outlined to the zoning board Thursday night, would be to create about the entire 160 acres into a golf course, immediately along with the country club, swimming pool and motor inn and then shortly thereafter to construct an initial 200 apartment units.

The balance of the apartment units would be programmed over several years so as to provide a reasonable and carefully selected occupancy rate, Duke said.

Duke described the parcel as "property of beautiful rolling terrain with many trees which are planned to be saved. The small stream now crossing the property will be dammed and turned into a very large lake with covered bridges crossing it, he said.

year.

City tax bills are now due and payable at the treasurer's office in the City Hall on Liberty Street, anytime during regular office hours.

The deadline for paying these taxes without penalty to cover the city's operating expenses for the 1961-62 fiscal year is Monday, August 31. Any city tax bills not paid by this date will be subject to a 4 per cent penalty charge.

YOU will be able to continue to pay these delinquent bills at the city treasurer's office at the City Hall with four per cent penalty added through the balance of 1961 and during the first two months of 1962. But after the end of February, 1962, it will be necessary to go to the county treasurer's office in Pontiac to make payment.

In addition to the 4 per cent penalty you will also have to pay an added charge of 1/2 of one per cent for each month the bills remain outstanding after having been turned over to the county.

Unlike school, county and township taxes, city of Farmington taxes are not levied on state equalized valuations given to your property but, in actual assessed valuations placed on it.

which is expected to continue at an equal or even higher rate of speed than in previous years.

G. V. Harrison, superintendent, said.

NEARLY \$4 million in the proposed budget is earmarked to be spent for principals, consultants and teachers' salaries and the normal operating materials used by them during the course of the school year. Another \$170,000 is to be spent for district-wide administrative expenses including salaries for the superintendent and other administrators and for their clerical help and the supplies used by them.

For plant operations the budget proposed runs \$574,538. Other substantial expenditures slated are \$171,154 for pupil transportation services; \$134,000 for plant and equipment maintenance; \$117,914 for fixed charges of which \$75,000 is expected to be needed to share in the cost for providing a hospital and medical insurance plan for employees; and \$89,000 for capital outlay expenses.

THE "LONGS SHARE" of the money to satisfy this proposed budget will come from two sources - personnel - a real taxes from property owners in the district and state aid payments.

It has been estimated that current tax receipts will bring in \$2,214,124 with another \$120,000 coming in delinquent tax payments. This is up almost \$385,000 from the amount collected in local school taxes last year. An additional \$3 per \$1,000 in equalized valuation levy authorized by the voters plus increased valuation in the district due to growth results in

research.

THE GRANT money will go to pay teachers' salaries for their work on instruction and salaries for substitute teachers for release-time days, costs of testing materials, test scoring expenses and a projected salary of the consultants' time. Local districts will furnish all classroom supplies.

The ITA approach is based on the belief that reading consists basically of deciphering a code. The complexity and ambiguity of the traditional alphabet and spelling indicates a simpler code for the young learner would help him understand the concept of coding. Children are usually able to move into the more complex, traditional code after one to three semesters of reading writing and spelling with ITA.

THE LANGUAGE arts approach will begin with young children in the first year of school. Individual reading vocabularies develop as the children see their stories in print. They are guided and encouraged by their own personal interests and levels of reading ability. Instruction on letter sounds and letter recognition is incorporated into the individual work the teachers do with each child.

To assure high teacher interest, these classes using the basic reading approach will have books the teachers have not used before. A system of trading between school districts is being arranged to cut costs.

This approach places strong emphasis on phonics and the development of word-recognition skills.

Districts taking part in this program, besides Farmington are: Pontiac, Waterford, Clarkston, Walled Lake, Oak Park, Hazel Park, Troy, Royal Oak, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Rochester, Ferndale and Lamphere.
