The Farmington City Council has authorized City Manager John Dinan to appoint a police officer of the Public Safety Department to the office of constable, effective August 15 of this year, to replace the part time fee basis constables presently serving the Farmington Municipal Court. The action was taken at the regular council meeting Monday night, July 6, following a recommendation from the Director of the Public Safety Department, Maurice D. Foltz.


