

G.O.P. Women Announce Plans

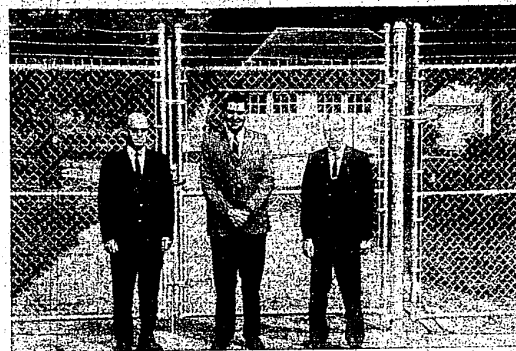

Talking Over Beam of Light Is in Future Telephone Plans

Someday you may be talking over a beam of light. On a long distance call today, your voice frequently travels part of the way on invisible radio beams. These radio signals, called microwaves, are used to carry telephone calls and television programs around the country.

With the continued growth in the communications field, however, scientists are searching for new transmission methods. For years, they have tried to harness light waves. Six years ago, two scientists hit on ideas that have evolved into the optical maser or laser.

These Bell-Labs scientists saw the device as an extension of the maser, an amplifier used in space communications experiments. This amplifier utilizes radiation of atoms for transmission.

Scientists know that atoms emit radiation. For instance, the "excited" atoms in neon signs do that. But normally, the signals radiate their characteristic red light in random directions and at random times.

The researchers are convinced they can do this. More than 500 industrial and academic research teams are now conducting research on the laser.

So far, most lasers are still in the experimental stage.
